DAVIS SENTENCED.
 The Shawangunk Mountain Outlaw Gets Eight Years in Clinton Prison.
 RONDOUT, N. Y., June 13.—William A. Davis, the Shawangunk Mountain outlaw, indicted last week for forgery, plead guilty to one indictment and was sentenced to eight years at hard labor in the Clinton Prison. Three similar indictments are now pending.
 Davis is 34 years of age, and a giant in size and strength. He has frequently overpowered officers and escaped. When arrested recently for the present crime it was at the point of a revolver. He belongs to a highly respected family.

Rumor About the Tilden Will.
 New York, June 13.—A rumor gained currency last night that the Tilden will contest had been settled out of court. Concerning this rumor, Belos McClurdy, of counsel for the nephews, said that there was no truth in the report. He said the executors could, under the will powers granted by the will, make a settlement if it were agreeable to the other side, but nothing in that direction has been done.

Leaving the Soldiers' Home.
 EMIR, Pa., June 13.—The pensioners who are inmates of the Soldiers' Home are leaving as fast as their pensions for the last quarter arrive. Sixty-five have already left for their homes in different parts of the State. The Soldiers' Home committee issued an order requiring the inmates to pay 80 per cent. of their pensions to the general maintenance fund, which is the cause of the dissatisfaction.

Death of an Old Dock-Builder.
 NYACK, N. Y., June 13.—William Lindsey Lawrence, one of the most prominent citizens of Piermont, died last evening, aged 72 years. He was the builder of the Erie Long Dock at Jersey City and also the Erie Docks at Dunkirk on Lake Erie. He has had many important positions and was a prominent Mason and Odd Fellow. Mr. Lawrence retired from active business 20 years ago.

Died After Eating Eight Weeks.
 ASHLAND, Pa., June 13.—Mrs. Daniel Smith, aged 60, died last night at her home in Mabel Barry Township, after a fast of nearly eight weeks. On April 18 her only daughter died, since which time Mrs. Smith has refused to take nourishment of any kind. Excessive grief probably unsettled her mind.

108 Years Old and a Pauper.
 DELHI, N. Y., June 13.—The authorities have just placed in the County Almshouse here a man named Eri Grey, of Kingston, N. Y. He is nearly 108 years of age. He is remarkably well preserved and his powers of sight, hearing and speech are not in the least impaired by his long residence on earth.

Stricken With Insanity.
 SARATOGA, N. Y., June 13.—James R. Chapin, ex village president, was stricken with insanity on the street last evening as a result of the grip last winter. He tried to buy a revolver, saying he intended to kill himself. He was placed under restraint.

After Congressman Milliken's Seat.
 AUGUSTA, Me., June 13.—Ex-Governor Burleigh is anxious to represent the district in Congress now represented by Hon. Seth Milliken. He has formally announced his candidacy in a personal letter sent to a number of citizens throughout the Augusta district.

A NEW LINE OF WORK.
 The Position of Railway Postal Clerk Sought by a Woman.
 WASHINGTON, June 13.—The following letter has been received at the Postoffice Department from a school teacher in one of the Middle States:
 "In all the vocations of life during past time woman was considered inferior to man, but now she proves herself equal to and in many cases superior to him. The place woman is taking in this country increases daily. I have a desire to make a start for her in a new direction and get a position for which she is as well adapted as the sterner sex. I refer to the position of postal clerk.
 "I understand there is a mere possibility of one of the clerks on the R. P. O. being promoted, which will cause a vacancy. I am perfectly capable of taking that position, and wish to be considered an applicant for same. I am a graduate of a high school in Ohio and a Normal in this State. I am perfectly healthy and can well stand the trials of the position. I weigh 145 pounds and am quite strong, being an old school teacher, and plenty able to handle all mail sacks."

The Elliott Murder Trial.
 COLUMBUS, O., June 13.—Blanche Wilson, the young woman over whose shoulder and from behind whom W. J. Elliott is alleged to have fired the shots at Osborn, was put on the stand in the murder trial to tell the story of her thrilling experience. She corroborated the statement of former witnesses as to her position at the time and said the defendant shot over her shoulder into the crowd. Two henchmen testified that Elliott fired the first shot.
 Commander Lyon Not Guilty.
 WASHINGTON, June 13.—The court martial which tried Commander Lyon on the charge of negligence in allowing the United States tug Triana to strand on the coast of Massachusetts while on her way to relieve the United States ship Galena, which was stranded off Gay Head near Martha's Vineyard, have found him not guilty, and Secretary Troy has approved the findings of the court.

Stole a Valuable Diamond.
 New York, June 13.—Charles Scale, a merchant, of 15 West 23d street, was arrested last night, charged by J. W. Carroll, a paper manufacturer of 79 Duane street with stealing a diamond valued at \$45,000. The diamond is a unique stone, about the size of a pea, and is known as the "Orange Diamond." Scale was released on bail.

Shot Himself in a Potato Patch.
 SARATOGA, N. Y., June 13.—Sherman M. Honinger, a hardware merchant of Round Lake, bid his wife good bye, went into a potato field at the rear of the house, waved another adieu to his wife, and turning around shot himself dead. The cause is unknown.

A Debt for Over a Million.
