PATROLMEN DEFY THE MAYOR

Disarmed by Their Brother Officers After a Terrific Struggle.

The City in a Furore of Excitement-The Militia Ordered to be in Readiness-Thousands of People Gather About the Central Police Hendquarters and Break Windows-Bloodshed is Feared. BRIDGEPORT, Conn., June 16 .- There was

a serious riot in this city last night. For several weeks there has been a dispute regarding the legality of two Police ommissioners on the board in this city, and the old board of last year has held over and had secret meetings, attended only by Commissioners W. E. Grant, David Walsh and A. Rishor.

At a secret meeting last Saturday night they dismissed Chief Rylands, the Demo-cratic head of the police force, and Mayor crails head of the police force, and Mayor Marigold, Republican, refused to recognize their right, and officer Murphy, who had recently been suspended by Chief Rylands for drunkenness, reported to Capt. Pinkerman, the head of the police force in the absence of a chief, by order of the old Police Board.

The 48 patroimen of the city, when ordered out for duty last night, took aldes

The 48 patroimen of the city, when of dered out for dury last night, took aides on the dispute as to who were the legal commissioners, and one-third of them, Democrats, refused to obey the order to remain on duty. They openly defied Chief Rylands and reported to the cap-

Mayor Marigold, the highest authority in the city, was called, and ordered the men to obey Chief Rylands. One-third of the patrolmen refused, and the others were commanded to disarm their brother officers. This they did, but only after a terrific struggle.

Charged Upon the Hob.

When the militia were ordered to re-port, thousands of people gathered about the Central Police Headquarters and broke windows and created an up-roar. The reserve force of the police department was called out and charged upon the mob, and after a short combat dispersed it, but the rioters returned again and again, only to be repelled by the officers.

The militia could not be brought to the scene quickly, as Superintendent Barnes, of the Fire Alarm Telegraph,

could not be found.

The utmost excitement prevailed until Adjutant-General Embler, of Hartford, of the State militia, and Brigadier-General Van Keuren arrived. They ordered the militia to be in readiness and remain on duty all night.

The city is now in a furore of excitement and the station house is still surrounded by a howling mob and the lives of the citizens are still in peril.
