POLICEMEN AT WAR

The Trouble in Bridgeport Culminates in a Riot.

PATROLMEN DEFEY THE MAYOR.

Disarmed by Their Brother Officers After a Terrific Struggle.

The City in a Furore of Excitement—The Militia Ordered to be in Readiness—Thousands of People Gather About the Central Police Headquarters and Break Windows—Bloodshed is Feared.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., June 16.—There was a serious riot in this city last night. For several weeks there has been a dispute regarding the legality of two Police Commissioners on the board in this city, and the old board of last year has held over and had secret meetings, attended only by Commissioners W. E. Grant, David Walsh and A. Rishor.

At a secret meeting last Saturday night they dismissed Chief Rylands, the Democratic head of the police force, and Mayor Margold, Republican, refused to recognize their right, and officer Murphy, who had recently been suspended by Chief Rylands for drunkenness, reported to Capt. Pinkerman, the head of the police force in the absence of a chief, by order of the old Police Board.

The 45 patrolmen of the city, when ordered out for duty last night, took sides on the dispute as to who were the legal commissioners, and one-third of them, Democrats, refused to obey the order to remain on duty. They openly defied Chief Rylands and reported to the captain.

Mayor Margold, the highest authority in the city, was called, and ordered the men to obey Chief Rylands. One-third of the patrolmen refused, and the others were commended to disarm their brother officers. This they did, but only after a terrific struggle.

Charged Upon the Mob.
When the militia were ordered to report, thousands of people gathered about the Central Police Headquarters and broke windows and created an uproar. The reserve force of the police department was called out and charged upon the mob, and after a short combat dispersed it, but the rioters returned again and again, only to be repelled by the officers.

The militia could not be brought to the scene quickly, as Superintendent Barnes, of the Fire Alarm Telegraph, could not be found.

The utmost excitement prevailed until Adjutant-General Embler, of Hartford, of the State militia, and Brigadier-General Van Keuren arrived. They ordered the militia to be in readiness and remain on duty all night.

The City Excited.
The city is now in a furore of excitement and the station house is still surrounded by a howling mob and the lives of the citizens are still in peril.

The city is stripped of its police protection and thieves from New York are already arriving here, presumably to rob houses in the city. The rebellious policemen who were stripped of their authority by former James Huppin, Patrick O'Neil, Bernard F. Lennon, Charles Campana, S. Byrnes and John Murphy.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY.

An Insane Clergyman Murders His Boy and Then Commits Suicide.

ALEXANDRIA, Va., June 16.—While temporarily insane, Rev. Frank D. Lee, son of the late Cassius F. Lee, living near the Theological Seminary in Fairfax County, killed his nine-year-old son, to whom he was greatly attached, and then committed suicide. The tragedy was only discovered last night. The neighbors, suspecting that something was wrong, broke open the house and found the bodies lying upon a bed.

Mr. Lee was a man of superior ability and cultivation, was a graduate of the University of Virginia and of the Theological Seminary, and for several years exercised acceptably his ministry in the Episcopal Church. He was subsequently compelled to give it up on account of ill health and since 1886 has been living in retirement on Seminary Hill.

LADY BROOKE'S FLIGHT.

A Divorce Rumor in Which the Prince of Wales is Interested.

LONDON, June 16.—There is a rumor, which cannot be confirmed to-day, that Lord Brooke has filed a petition for divorce from his wife on the ground of adultery, the Prince of Wales being charged as co-respondent.

It is a matter of common knowledge that heretofore both the Prince and Lord Brooke maintained that the intimacy between the Prince and Lady Brooke was platonic.

Killed His Grandmother.

UNIONTOWNS, Pa., June 16.—Alexander Boyd, of Cold Spring Hollow, near here, shot and killed his grandmother, Rachel Boyd, about 1 a. m. The shot was fired through the door and struck the old lady, who was on the outside. The coroner's inquest developed the fact that Boyd had been much enraged for some time because his grandmother lived with him, and on Sunday last quarrelled with his father and demanded that he take his mother away. Boyd was therefore arrested on a charge of murdering the old lady.

Professional Sneak Thief Caught.

POTTSVILLE, N. Y., June 16.—A gang of burglars visited this place Sunday morning and entered both hotels and five residences, securing quite an amount of booty. The police of Hornellsville in the afternoon arrested a professional sneak thief named Davis at Portageville. On his person were found some of the articles stolen from Portageville. He was locked up.

Clark on Trial for Murder.

WOODSTOCK, Vt., June 16.—The trial of Lyman G. Clark, charged with the murder of Mrs. Miriam Marston, his mother-in-law, has begun in the Supreme Court here. The day was consumed in the selection of a jury and visiting the scene of the murder.

Crushed to Death.

CUMBERLAND, Md., June 16.—While at work in the Hoffman Mine, two miners named Jacob Legger, aged 50 years, and John Murray were caught by a heavy fall of coal, which crushed Legger to death and fatally injured Murray.

Connecticut's Senate Adjourns.
HARTFORD, Conn., June 16.—When the Senate met an attempt was made by the Republicans to have the bill, instructing the Comptroller to draw his order for all just claims against the State, put upon its passage. The Democrats, however, voted against it and had the bill referred to the Committee on State Expenditure. The Senate adjourned until June 29.

Suits Brought for Big Claims.

NEW YORK, June 16.—The Bragg Manufacturing Company has brought suits in this city and Brooklyn against the fire departments of the respective cities for an infringement of a patent taken out by Robert Bragg of California concerning a horse-releasing device. The claims aggregate three-quarters of a million dollars.

Railroad Strikers Return to Work.

LAWRENCE, Mass., June 16.—The strike on the Merrimac Valley Street Railroad has virtually ended, nearly all the strikers returning to work at former prices and hours of labor. The Italian laborers who took the places of the strikers have left town.

Boston's Financial Receipts.

BOSTON, June 16.—City Treasurer Turner reports the receipts for the year ending April 30, 1891, to have been \$27,927,812, including balance on hand a year ago of \$5,931,819. His payments were \$22,574,812, leaving cash balance carried forward of about \$4,958,819.

Fletcher's Death Due to Drowning.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 16.—A further examination of Fletcher's body has satisfied the authorities that his death was due to drowning. The gash in the head back of the ear, it is believed, was made by striking against the stones at the bottom of the harbor.

TROUBLE IN CANADA

The Political Situation Creating Wild Excitement.

LIBERALS ANXIOUS FOR A SPLIT

A Fradition that the Present Government Will Not Last a Month.

Abbott is a Canadian Pacific Man—Chapman and Mackenzie Claiming for the Ministry of Railway and Canals—Tupper Now Said to be the Only Man to Save the Ship and May Become Premier.

MONTREAL, June 16.—The outlook of the Conservative party is anything but encouraging, and it is admitted that Thompson's failure to form a Cabinet and Abbott's acceptance of the responsibility shows that the party is rapidly falling to pieces. Abbott is nothing if not a Canadian Pacific man. He was until Saturday a large shareholder and a director in that company, and he has made millions by his connection with it. He was mixed up in the first Canadian Pacific scandal and has no actual following in Parliament.

No one expects that this government will last a month, and it may go to pieces this week if it does not satisfy the personal affairs of Chapman and Mackenzie Howell, who are already clamoring for the Ministry of Railway and Canals. The only man to save the ship is Tupper, and it is expected that Abbott will, if possible, have the supplies voted and adjourn until autumn, when Tupper will meet the House as Premier.

Official Circles Excited.

OTTAWA, June 16.—The political situation here continues to create the wildest excitement in official circles. No one seems to know exactly how matters stand and even the most trusted emissaries of the Conservative party are continually putting their feet in it by making positive statements in the press which they have to contradict the next day.

CONFESSED HIS FAULT.

Parliament Listens to an Apology from the Prince of Wales.

LONDON, June 16.—According to programme the Prince of Wales was ready with his apology in the House of Commons. So was Berkeley Levett, to whom the Prince has been acting as a fidus Achates. Hon. Edward Stanhope, Secretary of State for War, amidst profound silence, and followed by the close and anxious attention of a House crowded on floor and in gallery, and speaking with the utmost deliberation, said that His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, on looking back upon all the circumstances of the gambling case, authorized him (Mr. Stanhope) to say that he now saw the error of judgment which he committed. The Secretary of State for War also informed the House that Lieut. Berkeley Levett had written to his commander (Colonel Stracey of the Scots' guards) expressing his deep regret that he had failed to act in accordance with army regulations.

Mr. Stanhope concluded his statement by saying that it was not proposed by the government to take further action in the matter. When Mr. Stanhope had finished his statement on behalf of the Prince there was a general outburst of applause, but when in his concluding remarks he declared the matter dropped by the government the cheers came only from the Tory benches.

A movement is on foot in several clubs to force the resignation or expulsion of Sir Edward Clarke in consequence of what is styled his "disloyal" speech in the bicaract trial, wherein he attacked the Prince of Wales.

Sir Edward Clarke does not seem to stagger under the aristocratic displeasure which he incurred by his attack on the Prince. Sir Edward is a man of the people, sprung from a respectable family, but not akin to the tana-ra-ra classes.

GIANTS BATTLE TO-NIGHT.

All Ready for the Contest Between Slavin and Kilrain.

NEW YORK, June 16.—All is in readiness for the round globe contest between Francis Patrick Slavin and Jake Kilrain for \$10,000 this evening.

It will occur before the Granite Athletic Club of Hoboken, and, as the managers declare that it is not an infringement of the law in any particular, there need be no fear that it will not come off as advertised.

Slavin will be seconded by Charley Mitchell and Ed Stoddard. Kilrain's squire will be Muldoon, and, probably, Mike Cleary. Jere Dunn will be the referee.

Skeleton Found by Workmen.

CORTCOOK, N. H., June 16.—The skeleton of a man was found at 11 a. m. by some workmen who were removing a shed on the Parley Beck place. The bones were found underneath the structure and gave evidence of foul play. There were two fractures of the skull and the thigh bones were broken. It was also shown that lime had been used to destroy the body. It is supposed to be the skeleton of Calvin Beck, believed to have been murdered by his brother, Parley, ten years ago.

Illegal Juries Drawn.

WHEELING, W. Va., June 16.—A sensation has been caused in legal circles of the State by the discovery that over four-fifths of the juries drawn since the session of the Legislature were drawn illegally. At its session the Legislature modified the jury laws, but owing to a misunderstanding the changes were generally disregarded. Dozens of important trials will be rendered void and thousands of dollars lost. In some circuits the judges have refused to hold court until the new law is tested.

Bills Before the House of Commons.

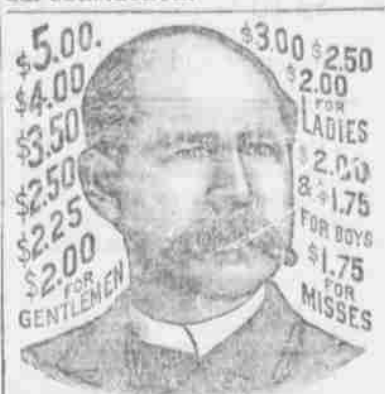
LONDON, June 16.—In the House of Commons the Hon. W. H. Smith moved that for the remainder of the session government measures precede all others. He said that all would be dropped except the Irish Land bill, the Education, and the Renewal of Gold Coinage bills. Mr. Labouchere protested, but the motion was adopted.
