Washington, June 18.—The new Congress of Chili, whose thembers are supporting President B Imaceda, has possed several important acts since its meeting. Among other things it legalizes all the acts of the Executive or the officers of the government that may by any construction be considered contrary to the consti-

An act has also been passed investing the President of the Republic with the following extraordinary powers during the progress of the revolution: First, be is authorized to arrest, imprison or pun-ish any person inimited to the govern-ment. He may expend the public reve-nue in his judgment without being submue in his judgment without being subject to estimates, and procure money upon the credit of the State without provious authority of Congress. He may declare any part of the territory of the Republic in a state of siege. He may appoint or dismiss public employes, of whatever rank or degree, without restriction. He may suspend or limit the right of public meeting and public discussion and the liberty of the press.

He may suspend the judicial power, except so far as its jurisdiction relates to civil and ordinary criminal cases. He may exampt from the jurisdiction of the tribunals of justice political cases of all kinds, and crimes growing out of the revolution. He may organize military tribunals and define their jurisdiction and authority as far as may not be con-

trary to law.
