Mobs of Infuriated Mongolians Invade Their Homes.

SEVERAL RIOTERS BEHEADED.

A General Uprising of the Chinese is Looked For.

Narrow Escape of an English Consul and Wife from Death—The French Residents of Shanghai Warned that Their Turn Will Soon Come—Two Missionary Steamers Seized Near Nankin.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—Details of the Chinese riots and recent attacks on missionaries and other Christians have just arrived by the steamship Gaelic from Hong Kong.

Two missionary steamers were seized just above Nankin, and the missionaries were compelled to escape in their boats.

The placard concludes that a general attack will be made on the 27th of the Chinese moon.

At Wulin the rioters proceeded to the English Consulate and threw stones through the windows and destroyed flowers.

BALMACEIDA GAINING.

According to a Government Report the Chilean Rebels Have No Chance.

LONDON, June 24.—A dispatch from the Chilean government at Santiago states that President Balmaceda is increasing the strength of the army and that his war vessels are attacking rebel ports while the rebel squadron avoids fighting.
