CRIMINALS ESCAPE.

Five Convicts Saw Their Way Out of Charlestown Prison. Boston, June 30.—Five prisoners escaped from State prison at Charlestown last evening by cutting away a bar in the window of one of the cells.

Charles Cross, sentenced to 13 years' imprisonment from Worcester for larceny, and Frederick Stuyvesant, sentenced from Lawrence to 25 years' imprisonment under the habitual criminal act, were captured.

The names of the escaped prisoners are James H. Coffey, Daniel Sullivan and John Lynch, sentenced for short terms from Boston.

A STAY FOR HALLINGER.

The Colored Jersey Murderer's Case Appealed to the U. S. Supreme Court. Trenton, N. J., June 30.—Edward A. Hallinger, the colored Jersey City murderer sentenced to be hanged to day, was denied a writ of habeas corpus in the United States District Court.

His counsel at once appealed to the Supreme Court of the United States. This act as a stay of execution, and the case may not be decided for at least three years.

The ground for the application was Judge Knapp's neglect to take testimony to determine Hallinger's guilt after he pleaded guilty, and also that Hallinger is a British subject, and, under existing treaties, entitled to a trial.
