DESPERATE FIGHT.

Over a Thousand Shouts Fired by White
and Negro Coal Miners.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 1.—The outlook
at the Franklin coal mines is still threaten-
ing and Col. Haynes has wired here
for another company of militia, to report
at once, and bring ammunition for a
week's service. Porter Robinson, one of
the mine bosses, was brought to the
city yesterday, charged with killing Tom
Morris and E. J. Williams, leaders of
Sunday's riot.

The guards say when the train was
pulled into Franklin the negro workmen
were fired upon by white miners. The
negroes went wild and could not be re-
strained by the guards. Securing their
arms they fired volley after volley and
only ceased when they white miners dis-
persed. Over a thousand shots were ex-
changed.

BARRY KNOCKED OUT JONES.

ALTOONA, Pa., July 1.—At 6 a. m.
about 100 sports from Philadelphia and
the eastern part of the State gathered
around a prize ring pitched in Cambria
county in which David Barry, a graduate
of the London Pelican Club, and William
Jones, colored, of Philadelphia fought
for \$200 and receipts. Jones lasted three
rounds, and was fumbled into a helpless
knot with a blow to the heart. Two-
ounce gloves were used.

More Earthquake Shocks in Italy.

ROME, July 1.—At Verona last night
the inhabitants were thrown into a state
of the wildest excitement because of
earthquake shocks. Many persons rushed
out of their houses and fled to adjoining
fields, fearing that their dwellings were upon
the point of falling. Houses were so
shaken that the walls collapsed. In
other chimneys fell through roofs and
large cracks appeared in the walls.

CHEERED PRINCE GEORGE.

All Countrymen Greet the Traveller on
His Arrival in New York.

NEW YORK, July 1.—Prince George,
the stalwart son of the King of Greece,
reached this city last night. He arrived
from San Francisco on his way home
from a trip around the world.

While the Prince employs the title of
Count Falster, by order of his father,
his gallant rescue of the Czar's eldest
son from death at the hands of a
framed Japanese has given the young man
so much notoriety that this means that
an ingénue has not been effective.

His arrival was greeted by a thousand
Greek residents of this city. They met
him at the depot and cheered themselves
hoarse.

As the Prince neared the crowd, which
filled every part of the depot, a child ran
out with a flag and handed it to him. He
took the flag, raised his hat, and another
shot shook his hat.

"Yes, yes, Prince George!"

With a head high the Prince walked
rapidly through the opening made by the
people, his stalwart and youthful form in
a light suit standing out in strong contrast
with the slight figures of the commoners, who were all in
ordinary dress. He stepped into the first carriage
with Mr. Gregor and was hurriedly driven
to the Envoy House.

Prince was served in the Prince's rooms
and he retired early. To-day he is see-
ing the city.

IRON MILLS SHUT DOWN.

All the Mahoning Operators Refuse to
Sign the Scale.

PITTSBURGH, July 1.—The conference of
the Amalgamated Association and iron
manufacturers is being conducted to-
day. Four firms have signed the scale.
They are Brown & Co. of the Wayne Iron
Works, the Anderson Iron Company of
Indiana, the American Wire Company of
Cleveland and the Whitaker Iron Company
at Wheeling. The Pittsburg firms
will still object to the nine-hour
clauses.

The scale has been refused by all the
mill operators in Mahoning Valley. They
shut down indefinitely last night.

The Catawba Manufacturing Com-
pany at Catawba refused to sign and
shut down the mill at midnight. Over
1,000 men are thrown out of work. This
mill has been non-union for 25 years.

PITTSBURGH, July 1.—After a long con-
ference the Iron Manufacturers' Com-
mittee of the Western District signed
the western iron scale of the Amalga-
mated Association for the year which
begins to-morrow.
