I did not make much progress with my patriotic editorial. I wrote:

"This is the maticual gain day, the day that for more than a century has been resonant with the echoes of patriotic music. —" Hangi Roay! Bing bong bang—bing-bing—bang—bang—bang—bang—ang——\*\*!!?\*!\*!!

But I railied, and wrote out: "It is well. Let the cheers be given with a will. Let the fireworks cleave the sky with their brilliant path of light-"

Here a small boy interrupted me, and I replied in small caps: "NO! I'm not go-ing to give you another cent to buy firecrackers with, and if you fire another one of them in this yard I'll alam you against the fence so you will stick there.


