LARGER THAN EVER.

The Mammoth Establishment Opposite the Lehigh Depot.

One of the largest and most complete business structures in the town is that located opposite the Lehigh Valley depot and owned and controlled by the Shenandoah Beef Company. The building has lately been very much enlarged and greatly improved to meet the constantly increasing demands upon the capacity of the establishment. The growth of the Shenandoah Beef Company's business has been wonderful. A few years ago it was the opinion of many that by erecting its original large structure the company was counting its chickens before they were hatched; but the company seized such a hold upon business that the large quarters gradually grew small until the extension now completed became an absolute necessity. The building has been extended 31 feet. The refrigerator department is now 66 feet long and 30 feet wide and seven tracks are required to transfer the beef from the cars. Before the change was made the place had a capacity for 40 cattle, or one car load of beef. The capacity is now doubled. The saleroom and office at the Centre street end of the building are attractive features. They are lined with white spruce, trimmed with oak. The apartments are furnished with electric lights and are as neat and clean as the apartment of any well conducted household. Manager M. S. Riggs has as cozy a little office as one could wish and Bookkeeper William Rowan sits behind a desk that would make many a bank counter blush with envy. At the north end of the building is the new stable of the company. It contains stalls for the three large and fine looking horses that are seen flitting about the streets from morning until night, hauling immense loads of meat to the various markets. The stable is complete in every detail and all the latest devices looking to the comfort and welfare of the horses and general cleanliness of the place will well repay a visit. It is one of those modern business places that take their growth from enterprise, prosperity and progress.
