It having decided to celebrate the 11th anniversary of the organization, the company gave a supper in Ferguson's front hall on July 11th, 1881, at which the members of the Town Council and other invited guests were present, and every year since the above date the anniversary has been celebrated. The following officers were elected on February 10, 1882, to serve during the ensuing term: President, Frank Lewis; Vice President A. F. Morgan; Secretary, E. W. Amour; Financial Secretary, C. D. Amour; Treasurer, P. J. Ferguson; Foreman, John Shultz; Assistant Foreman, John Barisch; Chief Engineer, C. D. Amour. On July 4th, 1882, the company took its engine "Shenandoah" to Mount Carmel and returned with a silver cup which was to be contested for by different companies, but all others failed to bring an engine with them and the cup was awarded to the Columbia Hose Company. The cup bears the following inscription, "From Antiquaries to Columbia."

The arrangement will probably enhance the pleasure of both parties.—Tri-Weekly.

In accordance with a proclamation issued on May 20, by Mayor Edward R. Stanton, of Hoboken, the statue
