HE WAS A LEADER IN THE BRITS ISH EMPIRE.

Some of the Unpublished Pages from the History of a Remarkable Life -It Reads Like a Romace-His Services to His &country.

The life of Sir ohn Alexander Mag-donald has been the history of Canada for the past sixty years. Born in tilns-gow, Jan. 11, 1815, he was brought to Canada in 1820, when eis father, Hugh Macdonald, settled at Kingston, Ost. He was educated in Kingston, and when 16 years old began to study law, he was admitted to the bar in 1835. In 1843 Mr. Macdonald was elected to the House of Assembly to represent the the House of Assembly to represent the city of Kingston in the Purlisment of United Canada, and in 1841 he was appointed receiver-general, holding office for the flest time.

Soon afterward he became commissioners

Soon afterward he became commissioner of crown lands, and in 1849, with his colleatines in the traper ministry, resigned. Until 1954, Macdonald remained in opposition. In that year, on the question of paying the "robellion losses, the Baldwin-Lafountaine ministry was defeated, and Macdonald became attorney-general in Sir Allen McNabb a condition ministry. In 1848 the premier had to resign on account of illness, and the attorney-general succeeded to the premiership.

In 1857 the Queen designated Ottawa, In 1857 the Cheen designated Ottawa, a small town at the junction of the Ottawa, Chaudiere and Iddeau rivers, as the future sent of government. Macdonald favored the decision, but Parliament did not, and the ministry resigned. Within three days it was back in power, and lasted until 1868. Two years of opposion passed before Mr. Macdonald returned to pen or as afterney-general under Sir Etienne Tache.

On July 1, 1867, the new constitution came into force, and the Dominion of Canada was formed. Macdonald was created a Enight Commander of the Bath that same day, and, as minister of justice and attorney-general, became the first premier of the Dominion. He held power until 1873, when he resigned rather than face the charges that he had been connected corruptly with the managers of the Union Pacific railway. He was succeeded by Alexander McKenzie, who held office until 1878, when, having reach within a few months of its constitutional limit, Parliament was desolved, and on Sir John's plan of a high tariff the Conservatives were swept into power continuously, returned by general election in 1887, and still a third time last March, upon the issue of trade reciprocity with the United States, though with a majority still further reduced.

city with the United States, though with a majority still further reduced. He enried out his pledges, and a high tariff is now Canada's tiscal policy—the N. P. or "national policy" which Sir John and his colleagues have so recently been defending.

Under his government the railway system of Canada has been developed greatly, the Dominion has been consolidated and strengthened, and a public debt of enormous proportions has been assumed. Sir John lived at Earnseliffe, in Gttaws, where his short, bent form and Disraeli-like face, were well-knoEn to every one. He had not well-knoEn to every one. He had not enriched himself by any of the acts for which even his hitterest enemies attacked him, but had devoted himself always to the interests of the country where he had been for so many years the most prominent figure.

Monument Erected to His Memory by Mrs. Leland Stanford.

Mrs. Leland Stanford's monument to Mrs. Lemmi Stanford's monument to Father Janipers Stata, the founder of California missions, was unveiled June 3 on the military reservation in Mon-tercy, in the presence of 5,000 people from many parts of the coast. The monument was unveiled by Miss An-toinetts and Mrs. Stephen Field, chil-dren of T. J. Vield, of that city, and Father Comentine Deymann delivered



the cration, giving a history of Father Serras life. Junge W. H. Webb de-livered the civic cration, statishing the work of Serra and its far reaching influence on the history of talifornia. The figure on the monument stands lifty feet above the high water mark, in a commanding and conspicuous place. Pedestal and figure are both of granite, the former being appropriately inscribed. Father Serra landed near the site of the statue on June 3, 1770, and founded the missions of Sau Diego, San Carles. San Antonio de Parina. San Gabriel, San Luis Ohispo, San Francisco de los Dolores, San Juan Capistrano, Santa Clara. San Remaventura before 1782. He died in 1784 at the San Carlos mission, at Monterey. 
