THE FROZEN NORTHLAND.

WILL LIEUT. PERRY AND WIFE MAKE EXPLORATIONS?

THEY ARE NOW ON THE COAST OF GREENLAND.

Is That Country an Island or a Continent?—They Will Endeavor to Solve the Problem—Bravest of Her Sex.

HE ARCTIC seas have no terrors for Lieut. Perry of the United States navy, and his pretty young wife, who, amid the cheers of a thousand people and a deafening chorus of steam whistles from neighboring vessels on the little steam brigantine Kite left the pier at the foot of Warren street, Brooklyn, June 8, on a long journey to the frozen North.

The Kite carries to their very persons and adventures two expeditions, two parties of scientific searchers, who will explore Greenland, if possible to its uttermost limits. Men have often before risked their lives on Arctic seas and left their bones to whiten on the snow. This time a woman goes—the first white woman who ever braved a winter in the land of the aurora borealis; the first white woman who ever dared the rigors and the privations of such a journey.

This brave and devoted lady is really a beautiful woman, a brunette, small and delicately formed. It must interest every woman in America—and every man, too, for that matter—to learn that she is only five feet tall and that only thirty years have passed over her shapely head. But she has the she who goes with her husband. So he, who has calculated all the chances, will keep her by his side.

The party headed by Lieut. Perry comprises, besides his wife, four men. The lieutenant proposes to explore the coast of Greenland, and to determine whether that frigid land is an island or a continent. When the Kite arrives at Whale Island, 77 degrees 20 minutes north, which may be in a month, for the brigantine can steam seven knots an hour, Lieut. Perry and his companions will disembark. They will find themselves there at the foot of Humboldt Glacier, whose glittering walls stretch 4,000 feet to the sky, which is the largest glacier in the world.

There the lieutenant will build a cairn in which he will deposit sufficient provisions to maintain his party for three years. Then he and his plucky wife and his co-explorers purpose to ascend the Humboldt. The natives say that on its summit is a plateau, and over that the lieutenant hopes to travel.

From Whale Sound this expedition will take a northeast course. This will bring them to the northernmost point ever reached by man, the point where the Greely expedition suffered so much. They will travel, not by alledge or by boat, but overland on "skiers," a modified and elongated

form of snowshoe. Lieut. Perry expects thus to make five miles each day he travels.

From the pieces that Greely reached this newest exploration will skirt the coast in an endeavor to learn how the coast lines trend, whether to the north or east, only returning to his base of supplies at Whale Sound when the provisions he can carry with him are about exhausted. Lieut. Perry's plans are to return by the route he takes over the coast next year or the year after, where he, his intrepid wife, and his companion can board a whaler bound for the United States.

The other party on the Kite is known as the West Greenland Exploring Expedition of the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia.

The scientists from the academy, of course, accompany Lieut. Perry on the Kite to Whale Sound. Thence the vessel will return direct to Umanavik and from there to Disco Bay. Some of the expedition will disembark there. Others will cruise on the Kite in whatever direction seems best to them to obtain the information they seek.

The land division will explore the interior of the country, in particular an unknown mountain back of Disco Bay, of which geographers know nothing, of whose inhabitants zoologists, and of whose flora botanists, are ignorant. Returning southward, several fjords will be explored, and the height of glaciers be determined as accurately as possible.

Near Godshaven there is another un-named and unknown mountain which will be climbed and examined. From there the party will go to Ivigtut, and thence to St. John's Newfoundland. Everywhere its members will make zoological and botanical collections and try to inform themselves of Greenland's geological formation. They hope to be home again about the middle of next September.

The Kite, besides being light and staunch, is a most comfortable vessel. Capt. Pike, an experienced mariner in Northern waters, commands her, and his crew is made up as follows: Chief mate, Edward Tracy; boatswain, Patrick Dunlap; chief engineer, William Jaydine; second engineer, Alexander McKelvey; steward, Patrick Welsh; cook, Thomas Pepper; Bremen, Andrew Root, Edward Cook, John Cunningham, Thomas Collins, John Cummings, John Verge, and Timothy Loomy.

The expenses of both expeditions are borne in part by the Academy of Natural Sciences and in part by newspaper enterprise and private subscriptions. Indeed, so enthusiastic are the men who are about to undertake these hardships that most of them have paid money from their own pockets into the expense fund.

HE IS A MASCOT.
