HIS BODY IN A WELL

The Dream of a Dying Wife Solves a Mystery.

MISSING WILLIAM SHORT FOUND

He Was a Car Cleaner and Disappeared Mysteriously Two Years Ago.

Neighbors Find the Corpse at the Bottom of a Well—It Was Easily Identified, no Sign of Decomposition Being Visible.

The Coroner to Make an Examination.

A Double Funeral.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Two years ago William Short, who worked on the Long Island Railroad, suddenly disappeared from his home in Jamaica, L. I., and since then he has been given up for dead by the neighbors.

His wife continued to carry on the house, and never would allow that her husband was dead, but repeatedly said that often she had visions of him and that he would turn up some day. His two children also frequently spoke of their father as being "at the bottom of the well," a well in the garden formerly owned by the railroad company for their locomotives.

Last night Mrs. Short died suddenly, but some of the neighbors say that previous to her dying she told them she had been repeatedly awakened at night by a vision of her husband, who stood at her bedside and told her that he had fallen down the well.

Two men, John Mayall and William Amberson, procured a fifty foot ladder, and descending to the bottom of the well were horrified to discover the body of the missing William Short.

The body was drawn to the surface and laid on the ground, where it was immediately identified by a number of the neighbors. The body was in a good state of preservation, there being no signs of decomposition. The depth of the well and the peculiar quality of the water, which contained a great quantity of lime, had preserved it.

The coroner will make a thorough investigation.

The bodies of husband and wife will be buried together to-morrow.
