O'MALLEY WANTS A TRIAL.

The Hennessy Murder Recalled by the Detective's Action.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Aug. 21.—After a long rest the sensational scenes based upon the assassination of Chief Hennessy are about to be revived. On the day of the lynching of the Italian assassin the crowd also looked for Private Detective D. C. O'Malley, but failed to find him. The Committee of Safety promised to look after him. During O'Malley's confinement the grand jury found several indictments against him for old sins. The only charge in connection with the Hennessy matter was for aiding his lieutenant, T. J. McChrystal, in attempting to bribe a jury.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

Thomas Eddington & Co., iron founders of Glasgow, have failed for \$250,000. The Chief of Police of Jersey City, N. J., in answer to telegrams from the West states that the Mutual Land and Building Syndicate had no financial standing. Benjamin Tappin, who was arrested at Nyack, N. Y., for assaulting his 13-year-old daughter, has been committed to the county jail to await the action of the grand jury. A fair onion crop is assured in New England, Orange County, New York, and New Jersey, but the crop is short in Western New York, Ohio and Illinois, according to elaborate reports from the entire onion-growing regions of the country. The following are the officers elected at the session of the Federation of Labor held at Lancaster, Pa.: President, Charles A. Miller, of Harrisburg; Vice-Presidents, John H. Driver, of Philadelphia; George H. Ulrich, of Philadelphia; W. A. Johnson, of Punxsutawney; Secretary and Treasurer, J. S. Johnson, of Allegheny. Chester was selected as the next meeting place. The Federation declared themselves opposed to affiliating with a political party as a body and decided not to recognize the Socialist's Labor party or the Farmer's Alliance.

SAVED JUST IN TIME.

Two Hundred Passengers Rescued from a Sinking Pleasure Boat.

Lawrence, Mass., Aug. 21.—The steam- or started Fawn, a pleasure boat plying on the Merrimack above the dam, sank shortly after 8 o'clock last evening close by the falls above the city. The boat had about 200 passengers on board at the time, but they were all saved by boats which came to the rescue. The vessel became unmanageable through the breaking of the tiller handle, but Captain Spates, with rare presence of mind, succeeded in steering her by means of wrenches when in the swift current near the falls and ran her upon an obstruction. Intense excitement prevailed among the passengers, and but for several cool heads a panic would have occurred among the women and children which would probably have resulted in the loss of life.

THE HOLY COAT ON VIEW.

A Great Multitude in Attendance to Touch the Relic.

TREVES, Aug. 21.—The public exhibition of the holy coat, said to have been worn by the Saviour, has begun. The exhibition was inaugurated by a solemn pontifical service, conducted by the bishop. The coat is in a glass case on the high marble staircase behind the high altar. A large cross, illuminated by gas, has been erected over the place where the relic is shown.

A great multitude was in attendance to see the holy coat, and physicians are overrun with applications for certificates on the part of the pilgrims who wish to touch the garment with the hope of being cured of disease. Neither the diocesan authorities nor the great and increasing throng of pilgrims apparently pay any attention to the charges affecting the authenticity of the holy coat. The railway officials expect an enormous passenger traffic Sunday, and have made preparations to carry 50,000 pilgrims. The burgomaster of Treves thinks that 800,000 pilgrims will visit the city during the exhibition of the coat. He thinks that most of them will bring their own food, so the problem of furnishing provisions for the throng will not be a serious one.

SHOT HIS WIFE DEAD.

The Burning Powder set Fire to the Child in Her Arms.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Aug. 21.—A most brutal and deliberate murder occurred on Park street, Pawtucket. Mrs. James Lyons was sitting in her little store with a baby in her arms when her husband entered, and pushing her into the street fired three times in quick succession at her, the burning powder setting fire to the child's clothes and killing the woman instantly. The murderer was arrested.

An Officer Beaten by a Drunken Man.

NEWBURN, N. Y., Aug. 21.—While endeavoring to arrest Cornelius O'Rourke, a drunken man, last night, Officer Miles was shot at by the man with a gun he had in his hands. The charge failed to take effect and the infuriated man used the gun as a club and beat Officer Miles over the head with it, inflicting several severe scalp wounds. O'Rourke was arrested.
