The Standard Dictionary.

Another great dictionary of the English language is in preparation, and will soon be completed. It will be called "The Standard Dictionary," and will be published by Funk & Wagnalls, New York. It will be at once a copious and critical dictionary of the English language, will have many distinguishing characteristics and will embody a great number of new and important principles in lexicography. The etymology of the word will be placed after the definition, and in defining the word the most common meaning will be given first. This will be a radical departure from the usual method, which gives first the etymology, and then the original meaning of the word, which often is an obsolete one. In giving the pronunciation of words the scientific alphabet, as prepared and recommended by the American Philological Association, is used, and it is believed that more accurate results can be obtained in this way than in any other. Terms used in science, handicraft and special subjects are gathered with great completeness and grouped without definition under the general word, and each, besides, is defined in its proper place. Thus, under "plumbing," we have all the terms used in that trade; under "apple," the names of nearly 400 varieties are given. The book will contain about 2,500 pages and 70,000 more words than any other single-volume dictionary. It will have pictorial illustrations on every page. It promises to rival all the great lexicons of our day, and in its special features will be the greatest work of its kind. No scholar will want to be without it.
