**REGION 'ROUND.**

A Budget of Interesting Articles on All Topics.

The Wadesville shaft, which has been idle since 1851, will likely resume operations again. The water in the flooded mine is to be pumped out and a shaft sunk to Skidmore and Buck Mountain veins, neither of which have been worked. Should they prove valuable, and there is every reason to believe that they will, the find of coal will last for at least twenty years. When in operation this mine gave employment to 500 men and boys, and a resumption of work will prove a great benefit to Wadesville, St. Clair and Pottsville.

The Mine Inspectors Examining Board are to recommend Governor Pattison to appoint Edward Roderick, of Stockton, an inspector of the new district and Patrick Biawitt, of Scranton, an inspector of the old district. They are the only applicants who answered 50 per cent. of the questions and the appointments will undoubtedly be made. The new district was created by the Mine Law Commission.

John Welsh, of Lost Creek, has been appointed L. V. R. R. telegraph operator at Mt. Carmel, to succeed Howard Grover, who goes to Laury's station.

**NO LONGER A MYSTERY.**

The Three Ohio Children Were Put in the Chest While Playing Jail.

BOSTON, O., Aug. 25.—The mystery surrounding the tragedy, in which three children of Mr. and Mrs. George Hamilton were found smothered to death in a chest in which they had been fastened, has been cleared up.

Walter Wardick, a playmate of the Hamilton children, admitted to his mother that Kirke Euliche and a boy named Pemberton, together with himself, while playing "jail" locked the unfortunate children in the chest, and being called to supper shortly after, neglected to let them out. When told that Wardick had confessed, the other boys told the same story.

The mothers of the children are crazed with grief, but it is hardly likely that anything will be done in the matter, as all the boys are under eight years of age.

**Three Prominent Citizens Dead.**

OSWEGO, N. Y., Aug. 25.—Oswego has just lost three prominent citizens by death. Treasurer C. Gilchrist, for many years a successful merchant; John B. Fayette, a manufacturer here for more than fifty years, and L. W. Peckham, an undertaker, who died at Salamanca while visiting there.

**Mrs. Warden to Get the Reward.**

CONCORD, N. H., Aug. 25.—The opinion is expressed by Governor Tuttle that Mrs. Warden, the mother of Christie Warden, who was murdered by Almy or Abbott, is entitled to the \$2,500 reward offered by the Governor in the name of the State for the murderer's apprehension, she having given the information leading to his arrest.

**Congressman Hoar's Wife Dies Suddenly.**

BOSTON, Aug. 25.—Caroline Prescott Wood, wife of Congressman-elect Sherman Hoar, of Waltham, died suddenly yesterday of heart trouble. She had been seriously ill for a week or more, but immediate danger was not considered possible. Her age was 80 years. She leaves two children.

**Struck With a Baseball Bat.**

MOUNT CARMEL, Pa., Aug. 25.—Felix Wassinski was struck over the head with a baseball bat last evening by Otto Schultz during a quarrel and fatally injured. Schultz is in jail.
