## TROUBLE IN CHILI

Santiago's Streets Filled With Raging Mobs.

DWELLINGS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Over Two Million Dollars Worth of Property Destroyed.

Balmaceda's House the First Destroyed—The City Paralyzed—Business Suspended and the People Keep Close to Their Homes—The Police and Fire Departments Thoroughly Demoralized.

VALPARAISO, Chili, via GALVESTON, TEXAS, Aug. 31.—The Chilianan regiment of the Congressional army took formal possession of Santiago last night, and practically the last act in the bloody drama of revolution which has torn Chili to pieces for the past seven months is closed.

As soon as the news reached Santiago of the overwhelming defeat of the government troops on the heights of Placilla and the fall of Valparaiso, and the people knew that Balmaceda's power was gone, and they had nothing to fear from his wrath, their enmity to his government broke forth.

The cry was raised that the President should be killed, and a mob started for his house.

It grew in numbers and fury as it went through the streets, and by the time it reached the executive mansion, was ripe for any bloody deed. Short shrift would have been allowed to the President had he been caught.

He knew that he would have little chance for his life if he remained at Santiago, and at the first receipt of the news of his overwhelming defeat he hid himself, and the bloodthirsty fury of the mob was balked.

Then the mob's desire for revenge found vent in the application of the torch. Soon Balmaceda's house was a mass of flames. Before it had been destroyed the mob marched off to the house of Senor Goday, the ex-Minister of the Interior, and an ardent Balmacedist, and set on fire his house.

Incendiaries at Work.

Then the residence of Balmaceda's mother, General Balmaceda, who was killed at the battle of Placilla, Senor McKenna and Eastman, the government newspaper offices and the houses of several prominent officials were burned to the ground.

The city was panic stricken, business was suspended, and people, outside of the mob, kept close to their houses. The city was lurid with the light from burning buildings.

The police, the fire department, and the army was demoralized and made not the semblance of an attempt to maintain order.

Balmaceda, when he heard of the fall of Valparaiso, sent for General Baquedano, commander of the government troops in Santiago, to meet him at three o'clock yesterday afternoon at Moneda. This Baquedano declined to do, but suggested that the meeting be held in the house of General Valasquez.

Decided to Surrender.

A council of war was held at Valasquez's house, at which President Balmaceda, the generals and other leading Balmacedists were present. The situation was thoroughly canvassed, and it was decided that a further continuation of the struggle was hopeless and that the surrender of the capital was the only proper course.

Baquedano was given charge of the city and was authorized to arrange the terms of the surrender with the Congressmen. Word was at once sent to General Caneto that all the troops in Santiago had declared their adherence to the Congressional party and that Santiago was at his disposal.

This despatch was supplemented today by a letter from Baquedano, which came by special train, and in care of a committee of leading citizens of Santiago.

Vanderbilt Will Pay.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—F. W. Vanderbilt will pay the 45 per cent. duty which amounts to \$24,000, on his foreign built yacht Conqueror, under protest, and the case will be carried to the courts to make a test of the constitutionality of the law.

As soon as the papers are made out and signed the custom inspectors on possession of the yacht at Stapleton, L. I., will be withdrawn and the boat again become the property of Mr. Vanderbilt.

The general opinion of the most experienced customs officials of this port is that the courts will sustain Mr. Vanderbilt.

To Meet in Joint Debate.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 31.—A special from Cincinnati says that Major McKinley and Governor Campbell are to meet in joint debate at Ada on some Saturday in September. Prof. H. S. Lehr, of the Northwestern Ohio Normal University, has been the chief mover in the matter, and has promises from both the leaders to meet on the same platform. Excursion trains will be run from all sections of the country about Ada. Twelve hundred students of the University will be part of the audience.

Military Affairs in France.

PARIS, Aug. 31.—Captain Borup, military attaché of the United States Government here, has been assigned to represent America at the great military manoeuvres on the eastern frontier of France this autumn. France mobilizes more than 100,000 men for these manoeuvres, which the Germans will watch with jealous interest.

The Dispute Settled.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Both of the holy coats have been pronounced genuine. The Congregation of Bites has decided that the holy coat of Troves was the one worn by Christ at the crucifixion, while the holy coat of Argenteuil in France, belonged to the Saviour when he was a boy. Thus the dispute is settled, and now there are two holy coats.

Paris Welcoming Daily's Company.

PARIS, Aug. 31.—Ada Rehan has arrived here after a delightful vacation at Trouville. Rehearsals for the Paris performance have begun, and tickets are selling much better than they did when the famous American company last visited this city.

A Chief of Police Dismissed.

DANBURY, Conn., Aug. 31.—Michael J. Keating, chief of police here for twenty years, has been expelled from the department by the common council. The charges were drunkenness and extortion.
