**REGION 'ROUND.**

A Budget of Interesting Articles on all Topics.

The new shaft at the Yorktown colliery of G. H. Meyers & Co. was completed last week. The shaft is 300 feet deep. Two 9 foot veins of coal have been discovered. Tunnels will be driven at once.

Work is being rapidly pushed forward at the new colliery of Markle & Co., located between Jeddo and Eckley. The slope, which is known as No. 5, Pink Ash, is being arched and put in readiness to commence operations. The firm expects this new opening to prove a very valuable working and through it will be able to procure the coal in the old Pink Ash slope. A pair of hoisting engines arrived there last week and will be placed in position in a short while. A breaker is to be erected there in a short while.

Hamilton Seymour, a miner employed at Pine Ridge colliery, Wilkes-Barre, had his head blown off by a premature explosion of powder. Another miner, who was standing nearer the spot where the explosion occurred than Seymour, escaped unharmed.

George Martz, of East Sunbury, was crushed almost beyond recognition on the railroad near Renova. Martz was a brakeman in the employ of the Pennsylvania railroad company. About 11:30 o'clock he was seated on a box car turning the brake with a brake stick when the latter broke, and the unfortunate brakeman fell between the cars.

The Faust family, of Ringtown, consisting of mother and five sons, had a very pleasant reunion on Saturday and Sunday last. The mother, Mrs. Catharine Faust, and son, William, live at Ringtown, Adam at Lehighton, Josiah at El Paso, Texas, Ben at Shamokin and Daniel at Shenandoah. Their ages are 68, 40, 45, 37, and 32 years, respectively, and this was the first reunion for 22 years.

Stanny Conket, of Mt. Carmel, is under heavy bail for his appearance at September court, charged with attempting murder. Conket, accompanied by several friends, were passing down the street when the former noticed a man for whom he had a dislike standing in front of a hotel. Conket drew a revolver from his pocket and fired several shots at him. One of the bullets lodged but a few inches above the man's head, but the others went outside of their mark.

The Luzerne county operators made their first semi-monthly pay on Monday. The following companies paid: A. Pardee & Co., Hazleton; Calvin Pardee & Co., Hollowood; Pardee Brothers & Co., Lattimer; Linderman & Skeer, Stockton and Humboldt; Milnesville Coal Company.

At all of the many weddings of Hungarians and Poles which have taken place in South Bethlehem there has been fighting and boisterous conduct, and the arrests by the police were numerous. The thing became very bad, and a few weeks ago twenty charges of assault and battery arose out of the festivities at one wedding. Father Heiman, of East Mauch Chunk, who is the pastor of the Slavic church being built in that town, has determined to stop the unseemly conduct, and, after marrying a couple last week, addressed them on the manner in which other weddings were held, and cautioned and advised them against any repetition of the proceedings. The caution of the priest was heeded.

W. H. Hoskings, Sr., who for sixteen years was inside fireman for the L. & W. B. Coal Co. at Ashley, Sugar Notch, Plymouth and Wilkes-Barre, has taken charge of a colliery for Leisenring & Co. at Minersville.

Discharged for His Action Four Years Ago.

New York, Sep. 2.—The trustees of the New York Life Insurance Company at a special meeting directed the dismissal from the company's employ of Theodore M. Banta, the cashier, who made the charges of mismanagement against the president and trustees of the company four years ago. One of the trustees of the company said that this resolution, together with the removal of Mr. Banta, sufficiently established the attitude of the policy holders toward the president.

For Allowing a Prisoner to Escape.

New York, Sep. 2.—The escape the other day, of the criminal Eugene O'Hara who was committed to Jefferson Market to await the action of the Grand Jury on the charge of attempting to murder Policeman McGuire, has resulted in Gate Keeper John Quirk being peremptorily dismissed for gross neglect of duty. Quirk did not deny that he fell asleep on duty. A further investigation is being made with a view of prosecuting Quirk.

Has Roosevelt Resigned?

New York, Sep. 2.—It is reported at the Custom House to-day that Theodore Roosevelt, Chairman of the Civil Service Commission, has tendered his resignation to the President. Theodore Balcock, Secretary of the Custom House Board, said he had heard the report of the resignation, but could not confirm it. Mr. Roosevelt is now on his way to his ranch in the West.

Is Gould After Another Road?

New York, Sep. 2.—The opinion is general in this city that the reason Jay Gould is spending so much time in Colorado and so carefully inspecting the Rio Grande, is that he hopes to join with the local contingent and purchase the road. Mr. Gould is still at Manitou.

John Flannigan, brakeman on the local Lehigh Valley freight train, fell this morning while with the train at A-hand and had his left foot crushed by one of the cars.
