Young Howard Appeals to His Father.

New York, Sep. 15.—Harry Howard, the son of a retired merchant of Burlington, Vt., who was arrested Monday night while playing at Haber's Museum in a sketch with Miss May Bell, a variety actress with whom he had "doubled up," for the theft of \$1,500 from a former employer, is completely broken down and has appealed to his father to aid him.

Receiver Yardley Sued.

PHILADELPHIA, Sep. 15.—Counsel for John W. Boughton has brought a suit in equity in the United States Circuit Court against Robert M. Yardley, receiver of the Keystone National Bank, for the recovery of \$449.30, the proceeds of drafts said to have been collected by the bank in March last, a few days prior to the closing of its doors.

Faith in Her Curative Powers Condemned.

QUÉBEC, Sep. 15.—A mandamus from Cardinal Taschereau was read in the Catholic churches of the city condemning the faith manifested by the French Catholics of the province in the alleged curative powers of a little girl who is declared to be endowed with supernatural gifts.

Fastest Long Trip on Record.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sep. 15.—The special flyer from New York over the Central, which arrived here at 3:50 yesterday afternoon, made the fastest long trip on record. The distance, 439 1/2 miles, was covered in 440 minutes, including three stops which consumed 14 minutes.

More Pay for Cigarmakers.

BOSTON, Sep. 15.—The Cigarmakers' Union at their meeting here announced that a new price list for packers which advances wages for packers about 10 per cent, has been accepted by the manufacturers in all union shops in the city.

Italian Die from Hancing.

GUTHRIE, O. T., Sep. 15.—A Government Inspector who has just come from the Cheyenne and Arapaho Indian reservation tells of a large number of deaths among these tribes. They have been holding a dance on the Quachita river. During the past three days nearly a hundred of the Indians have fallen unconscious during the dance and fully half of them have died. Scores of others are very sick.

Fatal Blow at Pool Rooms.

New York, Sep. 15.—The fight of the Brooklyn Jockey Club against the pool rooms, which has up to now been unsuccessful in keeping the pool men from operating their business, resulted to-day in the club withholding all entries from the newspapers. This will reduce attendance at the track, but will likely compel the pool rooms to close.

Arrested on Revolting Charges.

New York, Sep. 15.—Robert Bell, Assistant Sexton of Calvary Church, this city, is under arrest on charges of having abducted and criminally assaulted six Jewish girls, ranging from 14 to 16 years of age. The girls confessed and said Bell had been dishonoring the church for almost a year. Two of the girls he made drunk with communion wine.

Became a Raving Maniac.

LYNWOOD, N. J., Sep. 15.—John Sanders, a prominent young business man of Pleasantville, has suddenly become a raving maniac, and is confined in his father's residence in this place. It is said his mental troubles were caused by brooding over a quarrel which he recently had with his brother in regard to business.

Denies the Killing Now.

ELKTON, Md., Sep. 15.—Harry A. Price, aged 5 years, was found dead in his room yesterday morning with a bullet hole in his head. He was dressed, evidently, when shot, as he had on some of his clothing. Suspicion was cast upon his cousin, Percy Carr, who slept with him. Carr at first admitted the shooting but now he denies it.

Rockefeller Needs Absolute Rest.

New York, Sep. 15.—John D. Rockefeller, who has been confined to his home at Forest Hill, O., for some weeks past, is a very sick man. A corps of physicians examined him and declared him to be free from organic diseases, but decided that his nervous system needed absolute rest.

Smokeless Powder a Success.

WASHINGTON, Sep. 15.—The Navy Department has made a very satisfactory trial of smokeless powder for small arms of American manufacture. The trial showed a speed of 2,180 feet per second, with a pressure of 11.9 tons in the chamber.

Counsel for Mrs. Maybrick.

LONDON, Sep. 15.—The services of Sir Charles Russell and Sir Horace Davy have been retained to test the legality of Mrs. Maybrick's detention in prison.

Held in \$3,500 Bail.

PHILADELPHIA, Sep. 15.—The five mercantile appraisers have been held in \$3,500 bail each for appearance at the next term of court.

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
