Fitzsimmons' Escape Was Likely Well Planned.

A VERY DARING UNDERTAKING.

The Best Possible Detective Talent Engaged to Look for Him.

A Reward for His Recapture Also Offered. Two Women Who Supplied Him With Clothes After His Escape Now Under Police Surveillance-The Fugitive Well Supplied With Funds.

Pirishung, Sep. 16.—The escape of the otorious criminal, Fitzsimmons, from the county jail yesterday morning, is all-absorbing topic of interest in

The county commissioners and the chiefs of the Department of Public Safety of the city met in joint conference at 10 o'clock and arranged for a systematic search for the fugitive.

The county commissioners have offered a reward of \$1,000 for his capture. They have also arranged to employ the best possible detective talent and hope to run down their man within a short time.

It was ascertained a few days ago that Fitzsimmons received a draft for \$5,000; he had the draft cashed and handed the money to a friend for safe keeping. It is also known to the police that early yesterday morning after the escape of Fitzsimmons he was supplied. with a suit of clothing by two lady friends. The women are now under police surveillance.

An examination of the cell disclosed a An examination of the cell disclosed a very clever dummy occupying the cot. The iron bars of his cell door show that the sawing was not of recent date; that the bars had been only partly severed, only enough of the iron remaining to hold them in position. They had offered no resistance when the prisoner was ready to sten out.

CONSPIRATORS SURPRISED.

Tue Daring Scheme of a Former Penn-

Washington, Sep. 16,-Officers here Chili mail of the attempt of John Dow, a former Pennsylvanian and Henry Merriain, an English adventurer to \$800,000 in bullion which was secreted in the suburbs of Santiago by Balmaceda the suburos of Santacago by Balmaceus before shipping it to Europe. The con-spirators were surprised while breaking open the house in which the treasure was stored but both escaped arrest.

Dow remained concealed for five days

in the house of a relative of his wife, which was surrounded by Government officers. Dow refused to surrender and was riddled with bullets.

Dow came to Chill in 1880, claiming to be native of Pennsylvania and a citizen of the United States. He made con siderable money and married a half-bree Chilian gtrl. He and a man named Youngman concected a scheme to swin-dle an English syndicate of \$800,000. Dow alleged that he had discovered a rich silver mine.

The syndicate agreed to allow Dow \$1,500 for expenses to go out to his mine and also to get out the necessary papers to back the claim. He and Youngman forced an agent for the company, who went with them, to sign a statement that the mine was worth at least \$500,-

The agent was nexer seen again, and the scheme was blocked. Dow escaped prosecution on account of having some knowledge of a scandal connected with one of the members of the syndicate.

ferences and Dickering. Saratoga, N. Y., Sep. 16,-Not many of the delegates to the Democratic convention went to bed at all last night, or if they did it was only for an hour or two early this morning, for most of the night was spent in conferences and dickerings.

The Committee on Credentials did not get through with their work until long after midnight. Ten minutes was alowed on each side in all contests. The Eris County contests consumed the most time. William S. Mackey, speaking for the contestants of the First district, out-lined the condition of affairs in Buffaio ne scrious.
