

FOUND A NEW INDIAN RACE.

The Chief of the Labrador Expedition is Well Satisfied. HALIFAX, N. S., Sep. 18.—Prof. Lea, chief of the Howden College Labrador expedition, expresses himself as being more than satisfied with the results of the expedition. He had solved the question of the existence and size of the Grand Falls of Labrador, and found a race of Montagnais Indians never before known to white men. Their characteristics were noted and they were measured as to height, breadth and shoulders, height of hand, form of nose, nature of ears and distance between the eyes. These measurements will be shown upon charts at the World's Fair, and will demonstrate how this tribe differs from all other Indian races.

Window Glass Workers and Bosses Agree, and Work Will Be Resumed. PITTSBURGH, Sep. 18.—At a conference, last evening between the window glass manufacturers and a committee representing the workers, all differences were amicably settled. The workers withdrew their demand for an advance in wages, and the manufacturers agreed to pay last year's wages. The free will be lighted and work begin in the window glass factories at an early date; the exact date, however, will be determined at a meeting of manufacturers to be held within a few days.

To Be Treated For Brain Trouble. WASHINGTON, D. C., Sep. 18.—Commander Augustus G. Kellogg, of the U. S. Navy, lately on duty at League Island Navy Yard, has been removed to St. Elizabeth's asylum for treatment for brain trouble. A board of physicians had examined his case reported that his condition unfitted him for active service. The present trouble is said to be due to overwork.

The retirement of Jere Dunn and Dick Roche from the Granite Athletic Club of Hoboken is said to have been caused by dissatisfaction over the decision of the former in the Gibbons-McAniff's fight.
