REGION ROUND.
A Budget of Interesting Articles on all Topics.

On October 28, a Catholic elstuffed will be held in the cathedral at Scranton. Sixteen choirs will compete. The main prize is \$200 for the best rendition of "O Salutaris." The sixteen choirs have been trained for this competition by such eminent Welsh professors of music as Dr. Mason, John Lloyd Evans, of Wilkes-Barre; Hayden Evans, J. F. Roberts, of Scranton, and Thomas Watkins, of Olyphant; Prof. W. Rhys Herbert, of Hazleton, will be the accompanist to the Cathedral choir.

There were 59 arrests made by the Hazleton police for the month ending on the 15th inst. The fines paid amounted to over \$250, which is the highest ever collected in the borough.

The funeral of the late Dr. G. E. Heriz, the dentist of Mahanoy City, took place this morning. The interment took place at Milton.

The various coal agents of New York, representing the anthracite operators, met yesterday afternoon to fix prices for October. It was decided that after the 1st of the month prices shall be advanced according to grade and quality, on an average of 15 cents per ton.

An Italian woman living near Lotty gave birth to twins on Tuesday. On that night she was walking around making preparations to bake, and yesterday morning beat her husband and his brother.

The death of Robert Kintzel at the Almshouse, has led a number of disclosures which are calculated to stir up the honest indignation of every taxpayer in Schuylkill county. The coroner's jury rendered the following verdict: "The jury finds that Roger Kintzel died from neglect; that there was no one to nurse or take proper care of the patient; that Kintzel was put in a room where there were eleven other beds, and left to the care of the pauper inmates. The resident physician did not see Kintzel from Saturday morning, September 12, until after his death, although he knew that Kintzel needed special care and attention, but went away to attend to the patients of his father, who lives at St. Clair. The regular paid employe, who has charge of the hospital, did not see Kintzel from 2 o'clock, Sunday, until after his (Kintzel's) death, and from the evidence offered, we find that he gives very little attention to the people under his care, and leaves his work to be done by pauper inmates. The jury finds that Kintzel's wound would not have been sufficient to cause his death; but the authorities neglected to provide proper nurses, and left the man to the mercy of the inmates."
