EGAN MAY BE RECALLED.

Ex-Senator Blair Talked of as Minister to Chili.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Ex-Senator Blair's intimation that some big appointments were soon to be made seems to be verified, and rumor points the Minister's name in the list. It is said that Mr. Blair is to succeed Patrick Egan as Minister to Chili.

In the face of this announcement, Assistant Secretary of State Wharton says it can be stated on his authority that Minister Egan has not been recalled nor has Mr. Blair been appointed yet.
