Judge J. H. Broadly, the Democratic nominee in Nebraska for Supreme Judge, has declined to run.

The tug Bertha Enders was down in a gale on Lake Michigan, yesterday. The crew of six perished.

The Rockford oatmeal factory at Rockford, Ill., burned yesterday. Loss, \$45,000; partly insured.

Hon. Luther M. Goddard of Leadville, Col., was nominated for Chief Justice of Colorado yesterday by the Democrats.

The John Fowler Brewing Company of Covington, Ky., made an assignment yesterday. The assets are \$100,000 with liabilities about \$75,000.

The European envoys to the Columbian Exposition were inaugurated at the Palmer House, Chicago, last night, previous to their departure for home.

The President has appointed J. R. Burton of Kansas to be a commissioner of the World's Fair for the State of Kansas vice Rose K. Price, resigned.

The Kentucky Savings Bank of Louisville, Ky., has closed its doors. The depositors will be paid in full. This is the fourth bank failure in Louisville in six months.

Henrietta Murrell, colored, who was hanged yesterday at Smithville, Va. for the murder of her 8-year-old child, confessed the crime, claiming that she could not obtain work and support her offspring.

Leonard D. Rowell and James Leeper were hanged at Galesburg, Tex., yesterday, for the murder, on December 17, 1890, of J. A. Matthis, whom they shot as he was riding along a country road with his son.

GOV. RUSSELL AGAIN

The Unanimous Choice of Bay State Democrats.

A HARMONIOUS CONVENTION. The State Administration Unqualifiedly Indorsed in the Platform.

A Number of Renominations—The Platform Declares for Tariff Reduction and Revision, Protests Against Free Coinage of Silver, and Denounces the Disregard of Civil Service Principles.

WORCESTER, MASS., Sep. 30.—The State Democratic Convention effected a permanent organization yesterday by the election of Gen. F. A. Collins as president, with a long list of vice-presidents, which included Congressman O'Neil and Andrew, William Gaston, William Endicott, George M. Stearns, James S. Orinell, Leopold Morse, Hugh O'Brien, Frederick O. Prineas, Charles R. Codman and Dr. William Everett.

Mr. Collins was elected secretary. On making his appearance, Gen. Collins was given a rousing welcome. There were cheers, yells and hand clappings, and the air was full of hats, which were thrown aloft by the delegates.

John E. Russell, of Leicester, mounted the platform at 12:30. At the end of a brief speech he proposed the renomination by acclamation of William E. Russell for Governor of the Commonwealth.

The nomination was seconded by Hon. Edward G. Donovan, of Boston, and Wm. Eastus Russell, of Cambridge, was unanimously made the nominee by acclamation.

He was escorted to the hall by a committee and made a ringing address, in which he censured existing Republican opposition to tariff reduction, perseverance and unceasing effort and, calmly, honestly discussing the real issues, trust to the common sense, the conscience and patriotism of our people to decide aright between us.

The ticket was completed with John W. Corcoran for Lieutenant-Governor, Elbridge G. Cushman for Secretary of State, James S. Grinnell for State Treasurer, W. D. Trefoy for Auditor, and George M. Stearns for Attorney-General.

The platform begins with an unqualified indorsement of Gov. Russell's administration, and recommendations of State reform, and continues:

"We believe in free schools, supplied with free text books. We believe that every citizen should pay his just proportion of the public expenses, but we do not believe if he fails to do so by accident, the neglect of others or from his inability, he should be punished by being deprived of the most sacred right of citizenship—the right to vote. We regret that the domination of a Republican candidate for Governor, who, as a legislator, voted against the standard act, renders it necessary that we should urge every friend of the amendment to vote 'Yes' at the ensuing election."

"We reaffirm our sympathy with all wise and constitutional measures in the interest of manual labor, and we renew the declaration upon this subject in our platform of last year."

"The McKinley tariff bill against which the Democratic party of Massachusetts protested at its last convention, was requalified at the polls by one of the most emphatic votes ever cast by a free people. We renew our demand for the repeal of all its provisions which increase rates of duty, and for the enactment of an aggressive measure of tariff reform."

"The Republican party has destroyed the Central Bureau for furnishing political spoils by neglecting to bring prosecutions for the punishment of violations of the Civil Service law, by ignoring the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission for the dismissal of officials who have openly defied the law."

"We believe in honest money, the gold and silver coinage of the Constitution, and of a currency convertible into such coinage without loss."

"We believe that all dollars coined by the United States should be of equal intrinsic value, and that all paper money issued by the government should be redeemable in either gold or silver coin at the option of the holder, and not at the discretion of the Secretary of the Treasury."

The platform concludes with the declaration of opposition to legislation tending to debase currency.

J. Sloat Fassett and J. W. Vrooman, the Republican nominees, were accorded a fine reception in Ogdensburg, N. Y., yesterday.

Burglars broke into the Norton House at Pompton, N. J., Monday night, and stole \$500 in money and silverware from the safe.

The cannery factory of E. J. Morris & Sons at Lewes, Del., was entirely destroyed by fire at noon yesterday. Loss, \$7,000; no insurance.

The mangled body of a woman who had been well dressed was found on the Nickel Plate Railroad's tracks in Buffalo yesterday. There is no clue as to how she was killed.

The horribly mangled body of a man was found on the track of the Lackawanna Railroad yesterday at Delawanna, N. J. Nothing was found in the clothing to lead to his identity.

Jersey City police arrested the entire troupe of Walter L. Main's circus for parading in that city without a permit. The manager claimed ignorance of the ordinance and all were released.
