Fate of John Whalen, Who Was Killed By Will am Coy in Jealous Rage-

Whalen Had Intended to Elope With Mrs. Coy, But Her Husband Suspected and the Crime Resulted -- Whalen's Skull Crushed and His Body Cut Up and Burled in the Woods -- A Dog Unearths the Murder.

PITTSFIELD, Mass., Oct. 14 .--- Murdered at midnight, cut to pieces, and buried in the woods on a lenely mountain side was the fate of John Whalen, whose mangled and dismembered body was re-covered last night. William Coy is in Pittslield jall charged with the murdar, which was committed on the night of August 29 last, in Coy's tumble-down little farm house on a lonely road a mile and a half from Washington depot, 17 miles east of Pittsfield.

The Senate of Pennsylvania Considering the Bardsley Case,

HANNISBURG, Oct. 14. - The John Bardsby extenordinary session of the State Senate, convened by Governor Pattison was called to order at noon yesterday, by Lieutenant-Governor Watres. that hour the scene in the Senate cham-

that hour the seeme in the Senate cham-ber was a brilliant one. The seats of the Senators were occupied by their own-ers, with the exception of three. The Governor, in his message, which occupied nearly an hour in its reading, reviewed the arrest and conviction of John Bardsley, for the unbawful use of city and State funds, and dweit particu-larly on the evidence to the effect that on certain dates Bardsley received large sums of money for interest from banks and individuals to whom he had loaned funds of the State with the connivance of State Treasurer Boyer, Cashier Livesy and Auditor-General McCamant. The Governor mentioned several other cases where it appeared as though Auditor-Where it appeared as though Auditor-General McCannant, State Treasurer Boyer and Casher Livesy had connived with Bardsley to defraud the State out

of large sums of money. After the adoption of a resolution for the appointment of a committee to formulate rules of procedure, the Sanate adjourned until 3 o'clock this afternoon.

The first paragraph of the circular reads: "Recent changes in the United States postal regulations have rendered it preferable to more closely consult the interest of our Cana-dian patrons by establishing a branch office in Canada." 
