## THE RECORD BROKEN

Sunol is Now the Queen of the Turf.

SHE TROTTED A MILE IN 2 08 1-4

The Time of Maud S. Beaten By Half a Second at Stockton

The Foat Performed on a Kite-Shaped Track-Thousands Witnessed the Trial -The Record Has Stood Unbroken Since 1885 - The Conditions Favorable for Good Time--History of the Wonderful

STOCKTON, Cal., Oct. 21.-Sunol is queen of the turf. Ten thousand pecple, frantic with excitement, crowned her yesterday, after an exhibition such as the world had never seen before, and such as few outside her owner, Robert Bonner of New York, and her trainer, Charles Marvin, had hoped to see.

She made the mile without a break in 2.08 1-4, lowering the world's record, previously held by Maud S., by a half

Sunoi's career has ever been indicative of imperial greatness. As a two-yearold she made the then record of 2:18, and as a three-year-old reduced it to 2:10 1-2, which was the world's record

2:10 1-2, which was the world's record for that age. Robert Bonner was one of the first to appreciate her worth.

He was in thorough accord with the theory of her breeter, Leland Stanford, that a dash of thoroughbred blood was of exceeding virtue in maintaining the highest flight of speed, and as Mand S was growing old he was anxious that the world's record should be held in his stable.

He had paid \$40,000 for Maud S., and, in his opinion, the trotter who could equal it would be worth as much. He approached the old ex-Governor with an offer of \$41,000, and in a moment of haste it was accepted. From that day Mr. Bonner has never coased to proclaim his faith in the filly's ability to beat the record, and from that day have report has Mr. his faith in the filly's ability to best the record, and from that day never has Mr. canford ceased to wonder what made him sell the peerless filly that has brought so much fame to Palo Alto, where she had been toaled.

After the sale Mr. Bonner gave the filly to the charge of Charles Marvin, who had developed and driven her, with full power to do with her what seemed best. In her four-year-old form she

Mr. Bonner was not discouraged, how-ever, and allowed Mr. Marvin to keep her another year. Last week she es-sayed a mile over the same track which made her famous yesterday, but she failed because of strong wind and cuppy going. Last year, when some doubted Sunol's ability to capture the record, Mr. Hon-ner intimated that he might send Maud B, to further remove her own record from danger, but after consultation with Marvin he decided that Sunol was fit to care for it, and he mated Maud S. to Ausel, the son of the phenomenal

This was a happy thought of Mr. Bonner's and a considerate to the reputation of the grand old mare, whose mile in 2:08-3-4, made in Cleveland on July 30, 1886, had stood the test of years so well. Mand S. was retired with her record findimmed and now her stable mate brings in the new one, 2:08-14.

Sunol was bred by Leland Stanford at the Palo Alto farm in Santa Clara County, California, 32 miles from San Francisco. She was fouled April 14, 1886.
