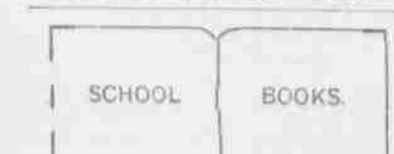

The Disabled Edam.
LONDON, Oct. 21.—The steamer Edam, reported to be in tow of the Scythia, was sighted 900 miles west of Queenstown. The Scythia will tow her to the latter port. Arrangements have been made whereby the steamer Rotterdam, belonging to the same company as the Edam, will leave Amsterdam, Oct. 23, for Queenstown and there take on the passengers now on the Edam and carry them to New York.

Long Drawn Out Will Suit.
WILLIAMSBURG, Conn., Oct. 21.—The will of Eunice R. Hoop is again in litigation. This is the third trial of the case. The will is contested by nephews and nieces on the ground of incapacity and undue influence alleged to have been exercised by E. McCall Cushman, a beneficiary under the will. At the first trial the will was sustained, but the Supreme Court of Errors ordered a new trial. In the second trial the jury disagreed.

Supposed Murdered Man Turns Up.
GRAND HAVEN, Mich., Oct. 21.—Chester Wood, a young wood-chopper, was lynched here in 1890 for the supposed murder of "Handsome Sutzgier," a hunter and trapper. The latter, who is over 99 years old, has just reappeared. He was greatly overcome when he heard of Wood's fate. The sweetheart of Wood went mad when he was lynched and his father starved to death.

Blaskovits is a Cheat.
BUDAPEST, Oct. 21.—Blaskovits is the greatest owner of race horses in Hungary. A great sensation has been caused by the statement that he has made vast sums of money by fraudulent betting. Suspicion had been excited by the fact that Blaskovits invariably won. It now appears that the jockey was in collusion with the owner to swindle the public.
