THE HOSPITALS ARE FILLED.

McCarthylten Attacked With Great Pury

by the Parnell Man.

The Police Had Their Hands Full in Quelling the Fight - When the Belligerents Could Not Strike Each Other They Would Bit a Policeman-Dition and O'Brien Powerless to Bestrain the Blot-

CORE, Oct. 28.-The hospitals and many of the house in the city are filled with wounded. The police and the sol-diers were prepared for a riot, and the police, at least, had their hands full.

When Dillon and O'Brien arrived they were seized upon by their enthusiastic followers, who insisted upon unhitching the horses from the carriage in which the leaders were seated.

A large body guard from Maurice Healy's quarter of the city, all armed with good, stout blackthorns, then surrounded the vehicle, which, in the midst of a terrific yell, began its progress toward the Assembly Rooms.

On the assembly Rooms.
On the aidewalks and side by side with
their opponents, half walked, half-trotted
a perspiring and hard swearing shrong
of Parnellites, while between the two
bodies of marchers want the police, manfully warding off occasional vicious blows of the blackthorns.

From the Assembly Rooms, Dillon and O Brien, escorted as before, proceeded to the Cork County Convention, where Mr.

Dillon acted as presiding officer.

In addressing the delegates, Mr.
Dillon complained of what he termed the "organized violence" of the Pornells ites, and made other illusions to the political situation, all of which were londly above.

After the convention a large body of police closed about Dillon and O'Brien to escort them to their hotel. Dillon spoke to the inspector in comman I, who listened condescendingly. The incident was witnessed by the Parnelittes, who hawled in derision.

For some distance the procession passed along without more serious demonstration, the crowds on the street, however, growing every moment more

The McCarthyltes, including a number of priests and the redoubtable Canon O'Mahoneg, followed Dillon and O'Brien. Every now and then a Parnellite in the crowd would howl and swing a shilla-lah around his head and make a dash for the McCarthyltes. The police would then charge and restors order for the mo-

At length the Parnellites grow uncontrollable, and yells of "Murderers!"
"Murderers!" "England's liokspittles!" and other epithets saluted the McCar-thyites, who came to a halt, turning on their assailants. Missiles of all kinds flew through the air, and the cries of defiance became louder.

The blood flowing from injured heads

and limbs, the groans of the wounded fallen, who had the flores energy of the combatants, and the ebb and flow of the tide of battle as the advantage shifted to either side, made a picture resembling the Communist risings in Paris.

The mounted constabulary formed for a charge. It was a daugerous duty, for deadly missles were flying on every hand. the order was given to cut right be-tween the two parties, where the police would receive the volleys from both. Not a constable flinched. They formed as perfectly as on parade, and started on the gallop. The order was to strike only with the flat ables of their sabers. There is no reason to believe that the order was disobered.

As the constables spurred forward the volleys of missles graw heavier, for each side was sure that if they missed each other they would at least hit a policeman.

The police were persistent, however, and at length succeeded in breaking up the riot, the rioters becoming apalled at the number of the wounted. Many of the injured were taken to their homes, and others to the hespitals.

#### Boycorting a Fair.

CORTLAND, N. Y., Oct. 28.—The Iron Moulders' Union has decided to boycott the Emerald Hose Company's fair. The reason for this move was an inoffensive stove of the Red Cross patent, which was among the douations to the fair. The moulders claimed it was made by scab workmen and demanded its re-moval, promising to put in a union atove in its stead. The demand was re-fused and a boycott was declared.

Conspiracy is Alleged. Boston, Oct. 28.—George A. Fletcher, one of the owners of the Bent Cracker Company, which was disposed of last April to the New York Biscuit Company, has brought suit against Dr. James W. Bartlett to recover \$70,000. Mr. Fletcher alleges that Dr. Bartlett was concerned in a conspiracy to defraud him out of a part of the promods of the sale of the cracker business.
