REGION 'ROUND.

A Budget of Interesting Articles on all Topics.

It is said the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, whose coal region terminus is at Mt. Carmel, intends extending its road through Shamokin in order to reach its valuable coal lands lying between Shamokin and Treverton. The Lehigh company has been using the Northern Central tracks from Shamokin to Mt. Carmel, but owing to the big royalty paid, its profits have not been large. It is reported that the Lehigh company may lay a road through to Sunbury and thus secure a western outlet.

Complaints were made to the Cambro-American Society, of Wilkes-Barre, that the selection "Come With Torches," for the chief prize, \$50, is not in touch with the singing societies of Wyoming and Lackawanna Valleys, as it is too high for the soprano. Taking these complaints into consideration the committee of the Cambro-American Society has selected another composition from Haydn's "Seasons," "Hark, the Deep, Tremendous Voices."

The arbitration case between the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company and the ten landholders at Coal Dale, by which the company expected to eject the latter because they sold liquor on the premises, was decided in favor of the defendants.

Narrow Escape of an Innocent Girl.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 30.—A young lady, 19 years old, giving her residence as a few miles out in the country from Byronto, Canada, arrived here yesterday on a train from Buffalo, being directed to a house of ill-repute. She says last week she met a girl in Buffalo who gave her name as L. M. Kendall of Pittsburgh, who persuaded her to come here and do housework. Before reaching this city she showed the letter of introduction to a passenger, who informed her of the nature of the house. Superintendent of Police Weir will see that the girl is sent home.

Gov. Bulkeley Recognized by Gov. HILL.

MIDDLETOWN, Conn., Oct. 30.—Judge Caffey, of this place, who is commissioner of deeds for the State of New York, was notified recently that his commission would expire on October 29 and that he must have a recommendation from the Governor for its renewal. The Judge forwarded a recommendation to Governor Bulkeley and yesterday received his commission. This is the first time Governor Hill has recognized Governor Bulkeley.

Transcontinental Record Broken.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—The record between San Francisco and New York has again been broken. Mr. John W. Mackay recently made the journey in 4 days 12 hours and 30 minutes. Yesterday Mr. James L. Flood alighted at the Grand Central Depot, having done it in 13 minutes less than Mr. Mackay. He left San Francisco on Saturday last at 7 p. m. in his car, the Grassmere, and followed the route taken by Mr. Mackay.

Three Years for Blackmailing.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—William H. Welsh, the bookkeeper who was arrested on Tuesday charged with attempting to blackmail Henry W. Box, a lawyer of Buffalo, N. Y., was indicted by the grand jury yesterday. He was then arraigned before Judge Martins in the Court of General Sessions, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to State Prison for three years and six months.
