

NOTHING SERIOUS NOW FEARED.

Senor Moutt is Thought to Have Brought About a Complete Understanding, 1

The Instructions to Our Navy in Chilian Waters Show that a Strict Neutrality Was Demanded Jorge Montt Offered the Presidency of Chill-The Excitement Fast Dylag Out.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 -For the first time since the receipt of the original warning dispatch from Capt. Schler a week ago giving details of the brutal treatment of the American sailors at Valparaiso, a feeling of confidence pervades every department of the Govern-ment to-day in regard to a pacific out-

tome of the Chillan difficulty.

Both Secretary Blaine and Secretary Tracy have expressed themselves within \$4 hours to the effect that nothing seriour was now feared by the Administra-

Their confidence is believed to be due greatly to representations which were made to them by Senor Montt, the Chillian Charge in Washington. Senor Montt has labored assidmously from the day of his introduction to the Secretary of State to bring about a complete understanding between the two governments.

His efforts to convey to his own government a true impression of the feeling in the United States have been encowned with gratifying success, and he took occasion to give to the Secretary of the Navy and the Secretary of State yesterday assurances of the friendly attitude which he has reason to believe has been assumed by those in authority at San-

At the first interview with Mr. Blaine the Secretary of State impressed very strongly upon Senor Monti the fact that

the Secretary of State Impressed very strongly upon Senor Monti the fact that in his effort to preserve the peacoful relations between the two Governments, the Secretary depended to a large extest upon the discretion and tast of the Chillan representative here, who was in a position to judge from personal observations of the real sectiment of the American people and of the firm but pacific attitude of the Administer, had a long conference with Secretary Tracy yesterday morning, and about noon the two went to the State Department together, and the conference continued with Secretary Blaine, Mr. Tracy taking part in it. It is entirely outside diplomatic usage for a foreign Minister to communicate officially with any but the Secretary of State, and the conference between Montt and Tracy is causing considerable comment.

Senor Montt left Washington last night for New Orleans, to be gone until next week. He declined to say anything respecting his visit to the State and Navy Departments, but expressed the belief that matters were progressing satisfactorily and deprecated the publication of sensational and tronble breeding stories. Secretary Tracy has made public his instructions i ssued to our naval squadron in Chillan waters during the recent internal struggle in that unnappy country. internal struggle in that unnappy coun-


