MORE CONVICTS RELEASED.

Offver Springs Taken and the Stockades Burned-The Authorities Helpless.

KNOXVILLE, Nov. 8 .- At 12:45 o'clock vesterday morning the guard of the con vict stockeds at the Big Mountain mine, five miles north of Oliver Springs, heard a knocking and threatening voices at a door at the southeastern end of the fortification. At I o'clock 165 murderers, this was and high waymen were flying over the mountains, guided by the great blaz-ing fire of the wooden fort. Thus the miners fulfilled their threat of five months ago.

The last convict has left the Walden's Ridge mining region. The stockades are dismantled or burned, and more than 450 desperadoes roam the mountains and valleys of Northeastern Tennesson Through the acts of these miners violating the law when the law refused to aid them, the government and the pos-ple of Tennesage find themselves faced by a complicated and perlious situation. Gov. Buchanan has confessed that he does not know what to do, and for once

the State, has demanded and received
