UNITED STATES MINTS.

Director Leech's Report—Largest Coinage in the Country's History.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Edward O. Leech, the director of the Mint, has submitted to the Secretary of the Treasury a report of the operations of the United States mints and assay offices for the last fiscal year. The value of the gold deposited at the mints and assay offices during the fiscal year, 1891, was \$30,625,678.08 against \$19,238,723.66 in the preceding year.

The deposits and purchases of silver aggregated 71,869,663.92 standard ounces, of the coinage value of \$83,630,154.31, against \$43,565,133.15 in the preceding year.

The coinage executed at the mints was the largest in the history of the mint in this country, aggregating 119,547,877 pieces.

Preparing for the Convention.

BOSTON, Nov. 11.—The first of the preliminary meetings of the dual convention of the World's and the National Women's Christian Temperance Union, which occurs Friday, was held yesterday by the executive committee of the World's Women's Christian Temperance Union. Representatives are present from all quarters of the globe, among them being Lady Somerset and Miss Hall, of England; Miss Tolson, the woman lawyer from Japan, and members from Honolulu, China, Australia, South Africa and India.

Heretic Temporarily Reinstated.

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 11.—The Allegheny Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church was in session all of yesterday and far into the night. Allegheny City Revision and the case of the Rev. H. Bausmann, of Rochester, Pa., the accused heretic, were the two important questions considered. The Bausmann case was temporarily disposed of on a compromise basis by the Presbytery sending him back to his Rochester charge, pending a further investigation into his orthodoxy by the investigating committee that has him in charge.

Ex-Governor Smith's Funeral.

ST. ALBANS, Vt., Nov. 11.—The funeral of the late ex-Governor John Gregory Smith occurred yesterday afternoon. A large gathering of distinguished railroad and general business men and men of political reputation was in attendance. The religious services were held at 2 o'clock, Rev. M. H. Buckham, president of the University of Vermont, officiating. Business in the town was generally suspended during the funeral and flags were displayed at half mast.
