WORK STARTED.

GROUND BROKEN FOR THE ELECTRIC RAILWAY.

POWER HOUSE WORK ALSO BEGUN.

Superintendent Eberle Settles Down to Business and Gives Some Interesting Facts Concerning the Project.

Ground has been broken for the Mahanoy City, Shenandoah, Girardville, and Ashland electric railway and the work of constructing the road has now actually begun.

Superintendent Eberle states that, now that the work has been started, it will be pushed until the cars are running. When questioned about the weather he said that the company will allow work to be done as long as the men are willing to work. Frost in the ground will not form an obstacle, but a heavy fall of snow may. Still, even in that case, it may be possible to push the construction.

At 7 o'clock yesterday morning 67 Italians, two gangs under the foremanship of Charley Amour and Pat Conry, com-

where the Robinson colliery fan house is and over the borough bridge that crosses the Lehigh Valley railroad; thence along the edge of the dirt bank at that point to the P. & R. railroad, which will be crossed by a trestle; the electric road will then strike the Wm. Penn road at its highest point and follow along the bench now being made to the P. & R. railroad crossing at Wm. Penn; thence along the old road to Cleary's house; thence through the swamp and strike the lower Lost Creek road; thence along that road until it strikes the road that is a continuation of West Coal street; thence through No. 2 breaker and Hammond colliery; through Conner's patch and on to Girardville, striking Second street; down Second street, to Ogden; out Ogden to William; along William to Jenkin street; thence to Julia street and out Julia street to the high road and thence to Ashland.

The Injunction Against Rev. Androchowicz of the Greek Catholic Church of Town Dissolved.

There was another act of the Greek Catholic church, of town, muddle in the Pottsville court yesterday. Several months ago Rev. John Wolanski, who came to town from Galicia to reclaim the church, having failed to secure or make a settlement with the priest in charge, appealed to the courts and secured a temporary injunction restraining Rev. Androchowicz from exercising the functions as priest of the church. The case has been dragging along ever since Rev. Wolanski having meanwhile returned to Galicia, where he now has charge of a large church.

Yesterday the court made the following order: "And now November 16, 1891, no exceptions having been filed to the report of the master and the plaintiff having failed and declined to offer anything in support of his bill, the injunction heretofore granted is now dissolved, the complaints bill is hereby dismissed at his costs."

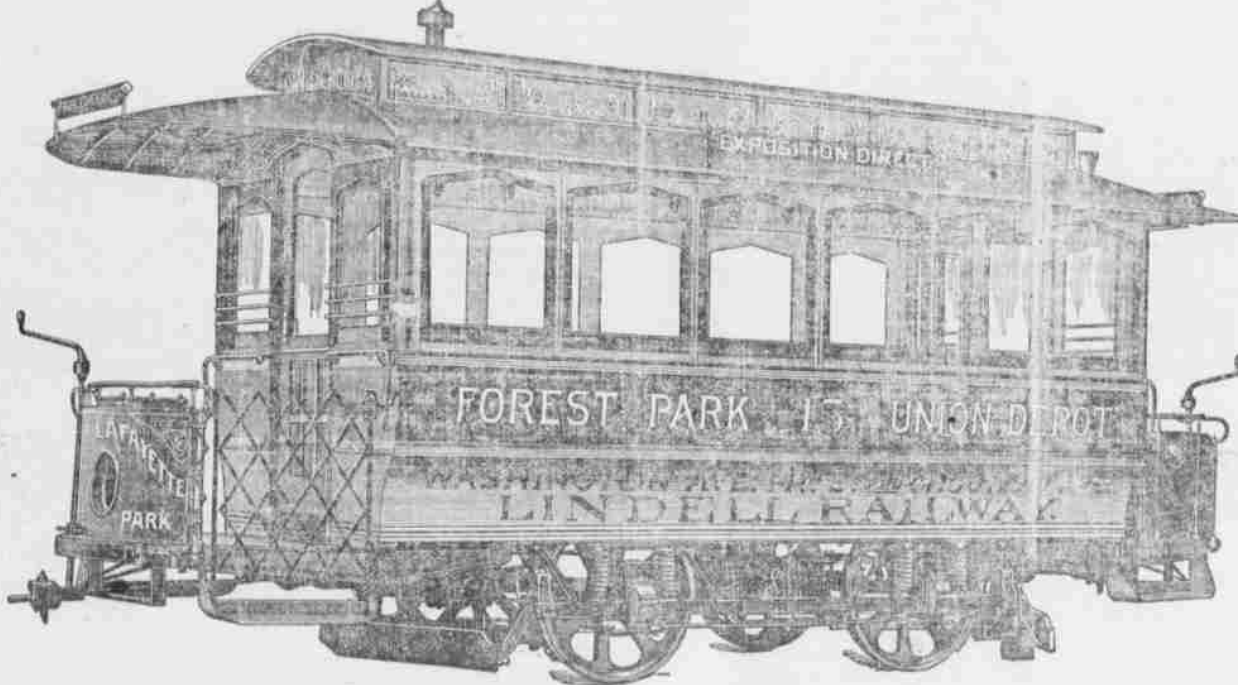

menced the first piece of track work for the company. Conry's gang started from the Turkey Run switch and worked westward, towards Wm. Penn colliery. Amour's men started at the colliery and worked eastward, towards Conry's gang. They put in a full day and made a very good showing. The work laid out for them was the cutting down of the embankment on the south side and widening the road so as to give the electric railway a traveling space independent of the turnpike, and the grading of the new part so that it would be ready for the sills and rails.

At 5:25 this morning Mr. Eberle, accompanied by about thirty Italians left the P. & R. depot for Ruppabaunock, where a gang was started under Foreman Amour to make excavations for the foundation of the power house, which is to be located in a hollow where the Girardville road forks, one going to Mahanoy Plane and the other coming in this direction.

Foreman Conry kept his men at work on the Wm Penn grading.

The contract for the building of the power house foundation has been awarded to August Kudel, of Mahanoy City.

The power and car houses will occupy a space 50 feet wide and 210 feet long. The building will be of mountain stone, the same as has been used thus far on the new Lihuanian church of town. The car house will have a sheet iron roof. The car house will be of frame, sheathed with corrugated iron and roofed with sheet iron. This building will be constructed to accommodate 12 cars and so arranged that an extension for the accommodation of 12 more cars can be readily added.

The cut of the car published herewith is a representation of the cars that will be used on the line.

The generators and all electrical appliances relating to the power station are now in a car at the Lehigh Valley station. The engines and boilers are ready to be shipped as soon as the beds are ready for them. There are two engines of 250-horse power each and both are of the Corliss type, made by Frick & Co., of Waynesboro, Franklin county. The boilers are from the shops of Scimpie & Co., of Philadelphia. The two engines will not be in constant use, it being the intention to hold one in reserve in case anything should happen to the other.

When asked about the route of the electric yesterday Superintendent Eberle said: "The route to which the present work of construction applies is from the Pennsylvania depot at the foot of Main street, Shenandoah, along Main street to Coal; out West Coal street and across the green

the towns will be different from that in the country districts. In the latter places we will use the side of the roads, while in the towns we will use the centre of the streets, therefore we have concluded to make the track in the town more solid. To do this we will lay the ties five feet apart and place on top of them stringers six inches high. The rails will then be placed on the stringers and the filling in required from the bottom of the ties to the top of the rails will enable us to make a perfectly solid track."

"There are some people in town who still have an idea that the electric railway will not materialize."

"That is an absurd notion. Such people evidently have no idea of what we have already expended on this undertaking. In cash alone we have already expended nearly \$15,000 and the cash expended, together with obligations incurred by contracts for materials, leaves the company with a practical expenditure up to date of \$65,000. Why, the wire alone will cost the company \$20,000. No, sir; the electric railway is a go, you may rely upon it."
