At midnight Almy was hanged in effigy by the citizens from a rope stretched across the principal street. The figure had this inscription in red

"Almy—this was done by friends of

The effigy has a framework of wood, neck, arms, body and legs. A white face is partially concealed by a black cap. A full suit of clothes adorns the figure. The boots are nailed on to the

After Almy pleaded guilty Judge Doe directed that the 80 special jurymen be dismissed. Attorney-General Barnard says that all the evidence so far accu-mulated by the State will, unless the Court decides to pass sentence without hearing it, be put in.

The law of New Hampshire says that

in case a man who pleads guilty shall be found to have committed murder in the first degree he shall be hanged. If, however, he be convicted of murder in the second degree, he may be sentenced to imprisonment for not over 30 years and for a term as much less as the presiding justice may see fit to impose.



REJOICES IN MURDER

Naval Apprentice Wise and His Heinous Deed.

THREW A FRIEND OVER A CLIFF.

Both Mere Boys Who Ware Serving on an English Training Ship.

The Murdarer Confesses and Alleges as His Motive that He Wants to be Hanged -Treats the Whole Affair as a Joke and is Tickted at the Prospect of Meeting Death at the Rope's End.

LONDON, Nov. 17 .- The town of Weymonth has a sensation which is a matter of general discussion among the regular inhabitants of the place and noug the large number of persons who, owing to the salubrity of its climate, spend the autumn and winter

The excitement was caused by the arrest of a youth named Wise, who is only 17 years of age, on the charge of mur-

The case is peculiar in many of its details in that there was seemingly no mo-tive for the crims, and that the mur-derer displays neither fear of the cousequences nor remorse for his action

The fact of the murder would perhaps have been unknown to the authorities for some time, and the identity of the murderer might never have been estab-lished, had it not been that Wise, in a cold-blooded, undemonstrative way, confessed his crime, seeming to take pleasure in relating all the horrible de-table.

Wise is one of the apprentices be-longing to II. M. training ship Bosea-wen, sixteen guns, Commander G. A.

Here the two boys stood looking out seaward, still taking in the most friendly manner, when, suddenly and without provocation or warning. Wise placed his hands against his companion, and, exerting all his strength, shoved him over the edge of the preschilors all 6s.

With a sharek of terror the doomed lad clutched at the air in a vain attempt to save binned, and then fell with frightful velocity upon the rocks at the base of the chiffs.

Entirely unconcerned at the terrible crime he had committed Wiso wended his way back to the town and subse-

quently returned to his duties on board the Boscawen.

When Wise's companion did not re-

When Wise's companion did not return at the expiration of the time allowed to him, the officers of the ship made inquiries, and when they questioned Wise, the latter told them that he had pushed him over the cliff.

An investigation was immediately made, and on reaching a spot on the shore beneath the point indicated by Wise in his confession, the officers found the body of the boy. His skull had the body of the boy. His skull had been fractured by striking on the jagged rocks and he had received other terrible injuries. He was alive when the scarch-ers found him, but he died in a short

Wise was immediately placed under arrest, but he takes the whole affair nonchinntly, and laughs and lokes as though he had no believes crime upon

The prisoner has hitherto borne a good

character.

As the case stands at present the only possible reason that can be given for the heartless murder is that Wise is afflicted with a merbid desire to obtain notorists, or that he is mentally irresponsible for his notions.
