THE GRIP HAS A GOOD HOLD.

All the Doctors are Kept Busy. They Say Ten Per Cent. of the People Are Down With It.

The sick list grows longer with each day and hundreds of our town people are suffering more or less from that dreaded disease known as the grip. A HERALD reporter visited several of the physicians of town yesterday with a view to ascertaining to what extent the disease has spread. Most of the physicians visited were found to have quite a list of cases and an estimate that ten per cent. of the people are victims was considered by them as fair. Two of the physicians thought the estimate would go a little higher, but all agreed that the disease is not as bad and the number of people afflicted are not as numerous as three years ago. One physician visited thirty-three patients yesterday. He said that in some of the cases the grip seemed to be developing into pneumonia. Another physician said that the recklessness of some people was aggravating their complaints. He condemned taking sweats because people are too liable to go out into the cold immediately after and expose themselves to pneumonia. The same physician condemned the use of quinine, while another recommended quinine and whiskey in the strongest terms. In this connection a recent interview with an eminent Philadelphia specialist may make interesting reading. Dr. Carl Seiler said: "I have found that specifics for its cure are ten grains of benzoate of soda every hour in acute cases, a tablespoonful of some heart tonic and absolute rest. Neither of the two will act, all must be used together. "It may closely resemble typhoid fever, pneumonia, diphtheria, dyspepsia, spinal meningitis, inflammation of the brain, measles and various skin diseases. None of the symptoms yield to the ordinary treatment for the affections named, but disappear with the use of my specific. The memory is affected. The slightest effort, mental or physical, produces prostration. The mucous membrane throughout the body is relaxed. In many cases there is inflammation of the optic nerve, causing particularly a narrowing in the field of vision. Dr. T. H. Such drugs as antipyrine, antifebrin, phenacetin and other derivatives of coal tar, and particularly quinine, should be avoided, as they affect the heart, decrease the comfort of the sufferer and prolong the duration of the attack.

REMAINS UNIDENTIFIED.

Body of an Unknown Man at the Hospital.

The remains of an unknown man are awaiting identification at the Miners' Hospital, Fountain Springs. On Tuesday the man was at Penn Haven Junction. He told a Lehigh Valley railroad employe there that he was making his way to Shenandoah to attend the funeral of his brother. About 7 o'clock in the evening of that day the man was struck by a coal train engine in the Quakake Valley as he was walking on the Lehigh Valley tracks. He was sent to the Miners' Hospital and died within an hour after his admission, without having regained consciousness. There were no papers or anything else on the body of the man to give a clue to his identity. The hospital authorities have requested the Lehigh Valley people to make inquiries.
