### ANTWERP'S HORROR

The Dynamite Explosion's Terrible Result.

NUMBER OF THE DEAD GREAT.

Horribly Manifated Portions of Many Bodies Found by the Seavohers-

It is Expected that Many More Rodies Were Thrown Into the Water by the Force of the Expicaton The Ship Had Been Found Abandoned by Fishermon, Who Tried to Smuggle Dynamits Into the City for the bake of Larger Profit.

ANTWEND, Dec. 24.—The loss of life scensioned by the explosion of the cargo of the French dy namits ship is greater than was at first su possed, although exact number of killed will never be known, for the explosion must have killed many strangers about the ship and about the quay where the shattered

and about the quay where the shattered vessel was moored.

The ship was found by fishermen in the North Sea, abandoned, and with \$0.000 kilos of dynamite on board. The fisherman towed the develict to the giver in Antwerp. On arriving at the wharf they, knowing that dynamite was not allowed to be kept in any vessel at the docks in Antwerp, pretended to unload all that was on board for speedy removal. They concealed half the dynamite, however, on the vessel, intending to enoughe it into town, and make has to enwarge it into town, and make a large profit on the sale. One of the fisherman, who was nervous on account of the deadly character of the stuff, dropped in the hold a package, which he had picked up for sauggling.

Immediately a most terrific explosion occurred.
The horrors of the scene can hardly be

Crowds of people surraunded the ruined district immediately after the explosion. The number soon increased to such an extent that troops had to be sent for to maintain order and allow the sourciers to attend to their work. Fragments of the ship, intermixed with human remains, are scattered here

and there about the scene of the explo-Shattered logs and arms, hands and feet, boals and other portions of human bodies, are scattered about on all sides, and are being gathered up in barrows by police and workmen sent to the spot by the municipal authorities.

The neighboring wharves are strewn

with debris beameared with blood and mixed with pieces of human flesh.
Wheelbarrows full of pieces of dead

Wheelbarrows full of pieces of dead bodies have been taken away.

The quay is greatly damaged.

There are the usual strange freaks of explosion recorded. One of the ship's masts is said, by people who witnessed the explosion, to have been shot up, hundreds of feet into the air, and to have fallen down, like an arrow. It is now said to be stuck deep in the mud of the harbor.

Every window within the aweep of the concussion was shattered; doors were blown in and crushed as if by battering rams, people at a codsiderable distance from

people at a codulturable distance from the quay where the ship blew up were swept off their feet and hurled, bruised and bleeding, for yards.

Many are so severely injured that they cannot recover from their injuries; many others are badly out by falling glass and by falling places of the wreck-

The remains of 25 bodies have been so far discovered, and it is expected that many many more will be found in the Water.

VERDICT QUICKLY REACHED.

The Testimony of Several Experts Has Great Weight.

Mrs. E. M. Field's Testimony Brings Tenra to the Eyes of the Spectators-Other Members of the Family Present -Field's Personal Property Valued at 820,000-New York's District-Attorney on the Verdiet - The Prisoner Still Starving Himself.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Dec. 24 .- Aufirm, has been held before William H. Robertson, the commissioner appointed by Judge Dykman. A number of wit ness were on hand, but Edward M. Field was not among the number. He was not, in fact, present dur-ing the proceedings. Sheriff Gorman, of New York, was served by Lawyer John L. Wilkis with a commissioner's warrant requiring him to produce Mr. Field at the hearing, and the sheriff made return an affidavit of Dr. Crosby, the physician of Ludlow Street Juli, that Mr. Field was too iii to be removed.

The application for the luquest was made in the name of Cyrus W. Field,

made in the name of Cyrus W. Field, jk, and the other members of the family had been notified. Attorney Wilklo represented Cyrus W. Field, sr., Cyrus W. Field, sr., and Mrs. Ed. Cyrus W. Field, jr., and Mrs. Ed. Cyrus W. Field, jr., and Mrs. Ed. Ward M. Field arrived together. Mrs. Field waiked up to the Court House, where the hearing took place, with Cyrus W. Field, jr. Mrs. Field was dressed plainly and in deep morning—wearing a long black veil.

Lawyer Wikie had prepared to present a great amount of cumulative and corroborative evidence in the proof of Edward M. Field's insanity.

It may be noted that the testimony of the distinguished experts is very strong and, in fact, cumulative in the main.

The evidence presented by Dr. Carlos F. McDonald, President of the Lunacy Commission of the State, stripped of unimportant matter, is substantially as follows:

"Thave seen and examined Mr. Field

follows: "I have seen and examined Mr. Field "Thave seen and examined Mr. Field twice, my examinations lasting upwards of two hours each time, and as a result of these examinations, I have formed the conclusion in reference to his mental condition that he is at present insans, the particular form being melancholis. I am convinced that he was absolutely free and frank in his examination, and that evidences of feigning were wholly wanting. The physical conditions are those that would be found accompanying the mental conditions found." tions found.

Dr. Allen Fitch's testimony as to Field's condition sustains Dr. McDon-

Dr. Frank H. Ingram, who was formorly assistant physician at the New York City Lunatic Asylum, the same at Brigham Hall Hospital, and subsequent-ly assistant medical superintendent at the lunatic asylum on Biackwell's Island, examined E M. Field on Dec. 1.

After an examination which was in "After an examination which was in all respects satisfactory to me, I said that Mr. Field was Insane. The possibility of foigning was paramount in my mind, but, after thoroughly observing him, I was convinced that he was insane, as my recorded opinion shows."

Dr. Ingran's other statements are corroborative of Dr. McDonaid.

Mrs. E. M. Field followed. She had to be supported to the witness stand. Rev. Charles Cuthbert Hait, of Brooklyn, stoot beside her as she testified, and her voice chokel as she told the story of her husband's eccentric actions for two years past.

He had become very morose and ill-

natured, and she recalled one instance when he had been delirious. Her testi-mony was concluded in ten minutes, and there was not a dry eye in the court

After several other witnesses had been examined the case was submitted to the jury, and the jury retired Af-ter being out ten minutes they returned with the verdict that Edward M. Field is a lunatic and is not responsible for his actions. They also found that his personal property is valued at \$20,000.

District Attorney Nicoli says: 'The verdict of a Westchester County jury cannot affect in any degree the indict-

ments of the grand jury of the County of New York."
