The President Will Speak on the Chilian Question Next Week

Until His Message is Sent to Congress Nothing Definite Concerning the Stand the United States is to Take in the Matter Will Be Made Known-Admiral Brown on the Situation.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 80 .- To-day there is decide by a quiet state of things at the State Department, and It has become generally understood that not ring of importance regarding Chilian affairs will take place or be given to the public until Congress meets next week, and then the President will speak through

his message.

Meanwhile the departments here are waiting for some word or indication from the new Chilian Government as to its course in the matter.

However, in time of peace the United States is pretime of peace the United States is pre-paring for war, and while the authori-ties here see or think they see little possibility of war, they consider it would be criminal unfer the existing circumstances to neglect to make preparations for any event that might occur, therefore all work is being pushed ramilly.

While the Navy Department is, and While the Navy Department is, and has been busy for some time in preparing, the War Department, too, has shown much activity. Blue the State and Navy departments, the heads of bureaus deny all rumors to this effect and refuse to talk, but it is known that matters bearing on possible war are being considered earnestly. The services of the bureau of information of the Way Department are being called into use in this direction. Maps of the South American Continent and Central into use in this direction. Maps of the South American Continent and Central America have been in use in the bureau the past few days, though those in charge will not say for what purpose. How far the War Department has gone in its outlook, and whether any plan of campaign has been laid out in case heatilities arise is a matter of confecture. Jecture.

During the night the officers had quietly surrounded a noted illicit distillery and after daylight made an attack on it. The distillery was sur-rounded with rock walls, provided with port holes, out of which guns were pointed. Over 100 shots were fired in the battle that followed. The offers were repulsed and driven off. Kirk and Sprouse, two note! mooushiners, were killed and Deputy Jackson fatally wounded.
