Licenses Granted.

The court at Pottsville yesterday renewed all the old licenses of town, except three. The exceptional ones were those of I. H. Carl, who is under indictment for selling on Sunday; Anthony Golowski and George Butsavage. They were laid over for future consideration. In the last two cases the owners of the properties, Martin Fahey and Bernard Counaghan are applicants. Contested cases and new stands will be considered next week.

GREAT ACTIVITY.

The Washington Gun Foundry Going 11 Hours a Day.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—The extraordinary activity in the Washington Gun Foundry has not abated and the force there is working twelve hours a day instead of eight, the legal limit. Preparations have been made to the end that if necessary the entire plant can be run for twenty-four hours without stopping, by means of three shifts of men, each working eight hours.

The officials at the Navy Department say that no orders have yet been given to that effect, but all is in readiness for the twenty-four hour system. It is expected that in a week the yard will be going both night and day.

Much depends, it is said, upon the developments of the Chilian controversy, and by the end of next week, the entire aspect of things may be so changed as to render such speed unnecessary, but the officers at the Department think that this will not be the case.

Hurry at the Watervliet Arsenal.

TROY, N. Y., Jan. 15.—The feeling in Washington that a war with Chili is a possibility, if not a probability, is reflected in the extraordinary activity at the Watervliet Arsenal, or Government Gun Foundry, as it is now called.

Orders have been received by the foundry officials to complete all orders for the big guns with the greatest possible dispatch, and the rumor about the works is that the orders were accompanied by the admission that a necessity for the use of the guns was expected almost any day in view of the insolent attitude of Chili. Every man who can be utilized is now at work.

It is significant that the final polish and fancy finishing touches to the guns are left undone. Serviceable and not elaborately finished ones are needed. This has not been done since the rebellion.

There are now being built thirteen eight-inch guns that are each twenty-two feet long. These thirteen guns will not undergo the polishing process at all. The paint will be applied over the rough surface of the steel.

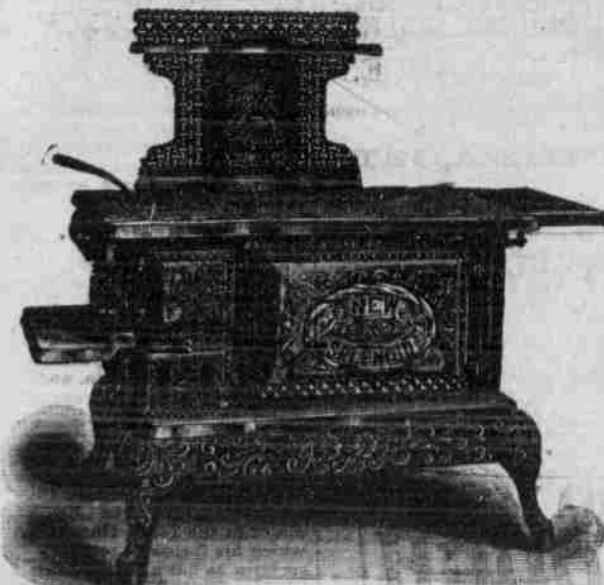
