**"Kicker" Kicks Again.**

EDITOR HERALD:—I regret exceedingly that I have been the cause of having so much space consumed in your valuable paper by correspondence pro and con on the water question. With this apology I ask your indulgence, and the indulgence of your readers, once more, I will try to respect your request to correspondents and be as brief as possible. I will not follow in the footsteps of "First Ward Citizen" and indulge in bill-boardage. I will depend more on reason and common sense. I said in my communication of the 19th inst. that Messrs. Lamb, Gable and Wurm were candidates for re-election to Council and that they were using the water question to boom them into Council again. I am indebted to Mr. Lamb for confirmation of my opinion. I hope those who read this will also read again Mr. Lamb's letter in the HERALD of yesterday. Does any sane man believe that Mr. Lamb did not have a desire to return to Council before he accepted a position on the joint committee? He well knew that the water works could not be constructed and be put in operation before his term of office would expire and he also knew well that if he was not re-elected to Council a question would arise as to whether an ex-member of Council could continue to serve on the joint committee as a member from Council. Mr. Lamb has looked upon his return to Council as a possibility, and has depended upon the water movement to make it a certainty. He has confirmed my statement that he had self interest in this water fight. He says, "if my position is wrong the people has to determine, and not the money of this corporation, or my personal enemies." In other words, Mr. Lamb will be one of those goody-goody candidates with a penny tin whistle, through which he will blow the notes, "Boodlee! Boodlee! Gentlemen, I don't want to go back to Council. All I want is vindication." Then, if Mr. Lamb's plan goes through, he will smugly resume his seat and say, "I told you I'd get there." Mr. Lamb is anxious to give the people a chance to say whether or not he shall go back to Council, but when a demand is made that he shall give the same people a chance to say whether or not they wish to spend more than \$45,000 on water, or whether they want to spend even that much, he draws the lines and cries, "Boodlee!"

To the voters of this borough, and particularly to the voters of the Third ward, I say, beware of the men who are constantly crying out "Stop thief!"

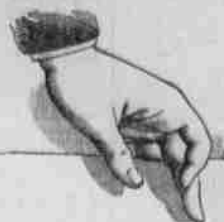

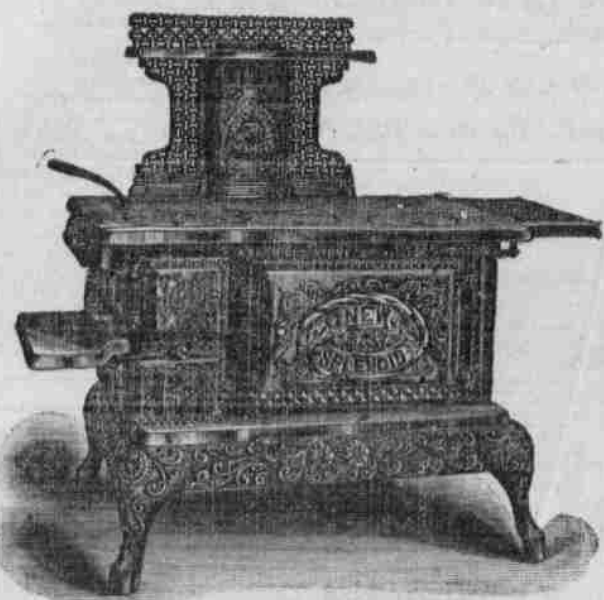
