Protest Against the Bills. TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 15.—In all the churches in New Jersey there was read yesterday the appeal issued by the Citizens' League of New Jersey, urging all law-abiding citizens to meet in Trenton at noon to-morrow, to protest against the passage of the race track bills which are now pending. Arrangements have been made for the running of excursion trains from all parts of the State, and the indications now point to a general invasion of the State Capital by at least two thousand people. Delegations are expected from Paterson, Elizabeth, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, and Camden.

Threatened With Annihilation. MYSTIC, Iowa, Feb. 15.—This prosperous mining town is threatened with annihilation by the action of the Iowa Central Railway in raising rates on coal to a point where it cannot be shipped at a profit. Heretofore 1,200 car loads a month have been shipped to Mason City, St. Paul and Minneapolis, but since the new rate went into effect the mines have shut down and over 500 men are out of work. The matter will be laid before the State Railroad Commission.

Cut His Face Open. ATLANTIC HIGHLANDS, N. J., Feb. 15.—W. Coe, an engineer on one of the steam dredgers here, had a dispute with a man named Peterson, resulting in the latter drawing a knife and cutting Coe's face open from the temple down about four inches. Although weak from the loss of blood Coe knocked Peterson down and gave him a terrible thrashing.

Rev. Charles Elliott Dead. EASTON, Pa., Feb. 15.—Rev. Charles Elliott, D. D., L. L. D., born in Scotland, March 15, 1815, graduated at Lafayette in 1840, and for the past decade instructor of Hebrew at that institution, is dead of the grip. His home is in Chicago, his duties requiring his presence at Lafayette but three months in the year.

For the Relief of Starving Russians. BEDFORD, Pa., Feb. 15.—An appeal for money for the relief of the Russian sufferers was made yesterday from every pulpit in Bedford county. A movement is on foot among the public schools to take steps towards raising money for the same cause.
