GERMANY AND THE FAIR.

Preparations Under Way for a Great Electric Exhibit. BERLIN, Feb. 23.—The Siemens-Halske Company is preparing for an extraordinary electric exhibit at the Chicago World's Fair, to show that Germany is not behind England or France in the advancement of electric science.

EMIN PACHA'S LETTER.

Accuses the English of Urging the Natives to Attack Him. BERLIN, Feb. 23.—Emin Pacha has written a letter to a wealthy German doctor named Finsch, to the effect that Captain Lugard, representing British interests in the vicinity of Uganda, had urged the natives to attack Emin when he approached that region with his forces.

Premature Explosion.

LEKINGTON, Va., Feb. 23.—A private telegram received here from Lowmoor, an iron manufacturing town on the western division of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad, announces, by a premature explosion of dynamite at the limestone quarry, a number of persons were fatally injured, among them Mr. John G. Thwott, a division line inspector of the Western Union Telegraph service, who had both legs badly fractured, eyes blown out and other injuries that make his death a question of but a few hours.

Garza Revolution Ended.

CITY OF MEXICO, Feb. 23.—A thorough investigation along the frontier shows that there is no danger of any uprising in Mexico. The Garza bandits who had been operating on United States territory appear to have disbanded, with no likelihood of reorganizing.

The Government's Bill.

BERLIN, Feb. 23.—Chancellor von Caprivi has introduced the government's bill aimed to punish those who betray the secrets of the State. One of the sections of this measure provides that any person who betrays the plans of a fortress shall be imprisoned for life.

Argentine Elections.

Buenos Ayres, Feb. 23.—The elections for governor and members of the Provincial Assembly have passed off quietly. The state of siege that was declared some time ago has been raised, and there is now no further danger of a revolution.

Great Strike Threatened.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Feb. 23.—Twenty thousand miners in the Hazleton region threaten to strike because of an order issued by the operators that hereafter they will pay wages once a month, instead of twice a month as heretofore.

The Pennsylvania Secures Control.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Feb. 23.—It is claimed here, on good authority, that the Pennsylvania Railroad has secured a controlling interest in the Wilkesbarre & Williamsport Railroad, and that it will be pushed to completion at once.

Dissolution Expected in France.

PARIS, Feb. 23.—The Cabinet crisis and the excited feelings growing out of it show no signs of abatement. The Chamber of Deputies met and adjourned shortly afterward. It is rumored that the Chamber will be dissolved.

Illinois Democratic Convention.

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—The Democratic State Central Committee has decided upon Springfield as the place and April 27 as the date for holding the next State convention.
