HAVANA, Feb. 25.—When play in the chess match was resumed, Teichgorin, having the move, played a king's gambit, which Steinitz accepted. On the forty-seventh move the game was abandoned, a draw. The score: Steinitz 5, Teichgorin 8, draws 5.

Petition in Voluntary Insolvency.

SALEM, Mass., Feb. 25.—Hon. Robert Couch, of Newburyport, filed at the Court House, at Salem, a petition in voluntary insolvency. His liabilities amount to \$55,238. His assets consists of houses and land in Newburyport.

Will Contest the Will.

DEARHAM, Mass., Feb. 25.—The will of Mrs. Sarah W. Glover, who died in East Braintree, in January last, leaving an estate of \$1,930,956, is to be contested.

KILLED HIS BROTHER.

The Murderer Gets a Policeman to Help Carry the Body Away.

St. Louis, Feb. 25.—Two brothers, William and James Hill, got into a quarrel at Twenty-third and Olive streets, and James stabbed and stoned William to death. James then hoodwinked an officer into assisting in carrying the body away, saying that his brother had a fit. While apparently searching for a physician for aid, the murderer escaped and is still at large.

Roberts Gets His Pezrago.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—Gen. Sir Frederick Roberts, who has been promoted to the peerage, is to be called Baron Roberts of Kandahar, in Afghanistan, and of the city of Waterford in Ireland. Sir Fredrick, who is considered the ablest officer in the British service, belongs to a Waterford family on the paternal side, his mother being from Tipperary.

Portugal Becomes Economical.

LISBON, Feb. 23.—The Senate has passed the Economy bill, reducing the expenditures and reorganizing the finances of the government.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

Mexico's coffee crop is promising. The volcano in Chiapas is in eruption. The balance in the Treasury is \$98,997,000. Speaker Crisp returned to the House yesterday. Two cases of typhus have been discovered in St. Louis. The amount taken in customs yesterday at Boston was \$121,000. By a railroad wreck at Columbia City, Ind., one man was killed. Michigan Republicans will hold their State convention on April 14. The President has postponed his trip to West Virginia until tomorrow. Eleven contract laborers have been returned from Baltimore, Md., to England. One fireman was killed and another injured at a fire at Baltimore, Md., yesterday. New York's custom receipts for the first twenty days this month amounted to over \$8,000,000.

A bill has been introduced in the Albany Legislature to authorize Brooklyn to establish a \$500,000 public library. Ex-Senator W. P. Whyte, of Maryland, says he thinks Whitelaw Reid, of New York, will be the Republican Vice-Presidential candidate. The steamship Majestic crossed the Atlantic from Queenstown to New York in 5 days, 20 hours, 22 minutes. This is a remarkable winter record. The Springfield, Mass., "Daily News" passed its twelfth anniversary yesterday. Its splendid enterprise and continuous growth in popularity, springing as it has from a little two page paper to its present prosperous appearance, testifies deservedly to the brilliant management of Mr. Bellamy.
