Is now the duly elected, lawful and visible bead and ruler thereof, and that to him alone belongs the right of administering the temporal sovereignty of the same and that whoever else intrudes himself upon the territory of that church to assume con-trol thereof effects only a forceable usurpation and a sacriligious violation of the sovereign rights of the church; therefore loyal Catholics can never rest content until that sovereignty be so re-stored, that at least in Rome, the Holy Father may have and enjoy an absolute and sovereign independence, and exercise therein a supreme and national control."

MUNIFICENT BEQUESTS.

#### Mrs. Wilstach's Will Provides for Many Deserving Charities.

PHILADEPHIA, March 3 .- The will of the late Mrs. William F. Wilstach has been read to the members of the family. The entire lestate amounts to about \$5,000,000. Every charitable institution in Philadelphia receives a bequest rang-ing in size of from \$1,000 to \$1,200. The valuable art collection, embrac-ing priceless paintings, engravings, stat-uary and works of art, estimated to be

worth \$1,000,000, goes to the city of Philadelphia. One-fourth of the residue, amounting to almost \$1,000,000, is also bequeathed to the city.






The Hawleys Indicted.
