**THOUSAND MILE TICKETS.**  
Those Issued by the Reading, Lehigh Valley and Jersey Central.  
That the assimilation of the Reading Railroad's recently acquired lines is steadily progressing is evidenced by the latest circular issued by General Passenger Agent Hancock. It gives notice that from April 1st the 1,000-mile tickets issued by the Reading Railroad Company will be accepted on all portions of the Lehigh Valley Railroad, except between Bound Brook and Newark. The New Jersey Central's issue of mileage tickets will be accepted anywhere on the Reading and Lehigh Valley lines, except between Jenkintown and Bound Brook.  
The mileage tickets of all three companies will be good on the Reading's Atlantic City line.

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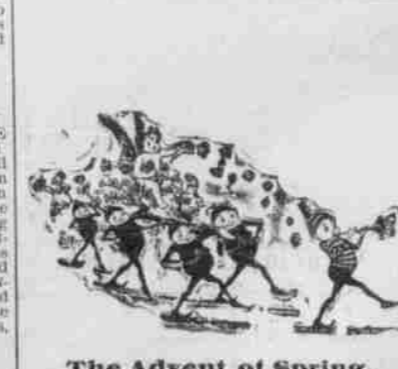
