**CONSERVATIVE MAHANOY.**

One of its Newspapers Intelligently Discusses the Paving Question.  
The Mahanoy City Tribune of Saturday last said: "There was a disposition on the part of Council at their special meeting, last Friday evening, to protect the interests of the borough, as against any encroachments of the corporation; and while their action in permitting the electric road to lay oak stringers inside the rails, has been criticized, it was difficult to do any better under the circumstances. The principal objection seems to have been on the matter of paving. Under the ordinance, the company is required to pave at least eight feet outside the rails, with mountain stone or other suitable material, and following the system now in vogue, in the manner in which the borough paves the street, this will mean to fill in the space excavated with loose cracked stone. It is claimed that this is not paving. Maybe it isn't but it will be uniform with the balance of the street, and this in itself is commendable. If the borough could afford to be independent in the matter, it might be worth while to compel the new corporation to pave with Belgian blocks not only outside and inside the tracks, but from curb to curb, on all the streets to be traversed, but such a requirement would be not only unreasonable, but foolish, because it would exclude the enterprise which promises to be of great benefit to the commercial interests of the town, and the prevailing sentiment is now favorable to the speedy completion of this end of the line, and the removal of every obstacle now in the way."  
"The line between here and Mahanoy Plane, must prove of very great benefit to our people, as well as a paying investment to the stockholders, or else some people are way off in their estimates of the future of the road."

**MOORS FROM MOROCCO.**

Thirty-five Men, Women and Children Brought to America.  
Ben Hadjali Pasha's Wild Moorish Circus, Caravan and Camp, which has been the sensational attraction in Europe during the past three years, will be seen in America for the first time this year in the Adam Forepaugh Shows. They comprise thirty-five men, women and children, who are the most celebrated of all Oriental performers. There are six women in all the only genuine Moorish and Arabian women ever seen in America without any exception whatever. Of these women two were ladies in the Imperial Harem, who were presented to Hadjali by the late Sultan as an altogether unprecedented token of admiration and esteem. This presentation created an intense sensation throughout the Sultan's Empire and caused for a time, ominous threats of a revolution. To still further establish the sovereign power, the Sultan granted Hadjali the further privilege of taking these ladies to foreign shores. The subjects did not dare rebel openly, notwithstanding their threats to do so. These people will be seen in the Adam Forepaugh Shows living in precisely the same manner as they do in the nomadic villages of the great desert of Sabara.  
Among them are several Kybales and Arabians, who are the direct descendants of the ancient Assyrians, and while now professing Mohammedanism in faith, they practice many of the superstitious ceremonies of the ancient and idolatrous race; they represent such as eating lizards and serpents, torturing themselves with fire and sharp instruments, making sacrifices of living animals, venerating the Eagle and the Dove and the Fish.

**A Striker Refused Citizenship.**  
Judge Albright, at Bethlehem on Friday refused to naturalize John Ferry, of Catusqua, one of the striking employees of the Catusqua Manufacturing Company, who was, in the November court, found guilty of interfering with workmen who took the place of the strikers. The judge told Ferry that he did not mean to be harsh, but in the opinion of the court the petitioner for naturalization did not come up to the standard of moral character required of those who want to become citizens.

**Telephone Company!**

**AN ORDINANCE** granting to the Pennsylvania Telephone Company the right to occupy the streets and highways of the Borough of Shenandoah with poles and wires as may be necessary for conducting its business.  
Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Shenandoah, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that permission be and is hereby granted to the Pennsylvania Telephone Company, under such conditions and regulations as hereinafter set forth, to occupy the streets and highways of the Borough of Shenandoah aforesaid, with poles, neatly trimmed and painted, and wire as may be necessary for conducting its business and to maintain the poles and wire in good, safe and serviceable condition.  
Sec. 2. That all poles shall be located on the curb line of properties at a place to be designated by and be erected under the supervision of the Committee on Highways of said borough.  
Sec. 3. That no poles shall be erected under such permission without the consent of the owners of properties abutting the location of said poles.  
Sec. 4. That said Telephone Company shall permit the fire alarm and police patrol wires and boxes of said borough to be run upon all the poles of said company within the borough limits.  
Sec. 5. That said Telephone Company shall pay the expense of printing and publishing this ordinance.
