**WHAT MIGHT HAVE BEEN.**

The Defeat of Judge Sadler Spots a Democratic Scheme.

A despatch from Chambersburg says the failure of Judge Sadler to secure the Supreme Judge nomination seems to be more of a disappointment to the Democrats than the Republicans in Cumberland county. The Democrats now realize the fact that two years hence they will have to fight another fierce judicial battle, as they did in 1884, when Judge Sadler swept the county by 1313 majority. Although not officially announced, it is safe to say that the present able jurist in this judicial district will again be the nominee of the Republicans, and that it will be a difficult job for the Democrats to match him with the hope of success. No other name is thought of by the Republicans, but the Democrats have quite a number of aspirants whose names are frequently mentioned.

It is said it had been fixed in the event of Sadler's nomination for Supreme Judge Congressman F. E. Beltzhoover would have been tendered the appointment by Governor Patton, and the nomination by the Democracy of the county, that is, if he was willing to swap Congressional for judicial honors. Such an arrangement would have suited Senator Lloyd, who would like to step from State to National renown, and then Representative Wherry would have been ready for promotion to the Senate.

It will be seen what was Judge Sadler's bad luck was worse luck to some Democrats in "old mother Cumberland."
