WITH BEFITTING SERVICES.

The Corner-Stone of the McMahon Hall at
 Philosophy Laid at Washington.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Appropriate
 exercises incident to the laying of the
 corner-stone of the McMahon Hall of
 Philosophy, took place yesterday after-
 noon on the grounds of the Catholic
 University. A large crowd of spectators
 including many of the most prominent
 Catholics in Washington and well-
 known clergymen, were present, among
 them being Cardinal Gibbons, Arch-
 bishop Williams, of Boston; Ryan, of
 Philadelphia; Corrigan, of New York,
 and Bishops Mees, of Covington, Ky.,
 Chappelle, of Santa Fe, and Vandever
 of Richmond, Va.

There were also about fifty priests in
 clerical garb seated on the platform.
 A procession, as announced in the lecture
 hall of the University, and proceeded to
 the site of the new building, where Car-
 dinal Gibbons, and Hon. C. J. Bonaparte
 delivered appropriate addresses.
 The building is 250 feet long, 100 feet
 in the centre, the wings being 70 feet
 deep. The central portion of the build-
 ing containing the great assembly hall
 will be erected last. When completed
 the building will be surrounded by a
 statue of Christ, "The Light of the
 World." It will not be opened until in
 the fall of 1894, when it will be equipped
 with the best faculty that can be ob-
 tained.

THE JURORS WERE SCARED.

How It Happens that Anarchist Rav-
 achol Escapes the Guillotine.

PARIS, April 25.—The finding of ex-
 tenuating circumstances in the case of
 Ravachol and Simon, and the acquittal
 of their three associates is attributed to
 pusillanimity on the part of the jury.
 It is asserted by some that, if Ravachol
 had not chosen to avow his guilt, the
 jury would have acquitted him also, an
 from first to last they were unable to
 conceal the terror which animated them.
 Indeed the Anarchists were treated by
 everybody throughout the proceedings
 with far more consideration than ordi-
 nary criminals, and Ravachol seemed to
 notice and to appreciate the dread with
 which he was regarded.

The general public are greatly disap-
 pointed with the verdict as it is feared
 that it will encourage, instead of deter-
 ring the enemies of society, and there is
 a growing in favor of martial law for a
 while, and the suppression of the Anarch-
 ists by a series of court-martials and
 summary executions, such as crushed
 the communists twenty years ago.

Very, the restaurant keeper who was
 instrumental in delivering Ravachol to
 the police, was in a very low condition
 this morning. The amputation of his
 limbs has been attended by a sinking of
 vitality that diminished seriously his
 chances of recovery.


