ATLANTIC CITY.

A Booming Season Ahead for the Great Resort and the Reading's Royal Route.

A new explosive called nitrojute is the discovery of a German scientist. 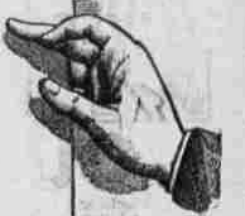
