Raising Hops in Alaska.
The hop-cultivators of the Pacific coast are turning their attention to Alaska. The season is believed to be long enough for the raising of crops, since the sun shines with almost tropical heat during the brief summer. 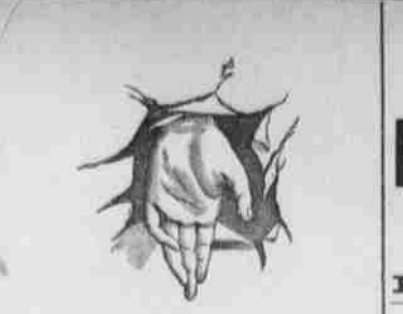
