### Marie Prescott.

Miss Marie Prescott, noted as one of the most beautiful and talented women on the stage, will appear in Shenandoah this evening and will present her own dramatization of H. Rider Haggard's famous novel, "Cleopatra." This work may be fairly acknowledged as the best novel Haggard has ever written, with beautiful idyls scattered through its pages from the pen of Andrew Lang. The novel is fresh, brilliant, beautiful. The play differs from Sardou's version of the story and, indeed, from that of any other writer, in that Anthony is almost entirely obliterated, or, at any rate, is used only for the purpose of bringing out in strong relief the great love for Cleopatra by Harmachis, a royal Egyptian brought up as a priest and secretly crowned as Pasraoah of Upper and Lower Nile. Those events bring him from the obscurity of his birth to the splendor of Cleopatra's court, where he becomes her high priest and her devoted lover, and in turn as devotedly loved by Charmion, Cleopatra's hand-maiden, whose affection, it is needless to say, Harmachis does not return. As Cleopatra makes no return of her high priest's affection, it will be seen that Harmachis is between two fires. The play ends with the death of the principal personages.

### Light From the Trolley.

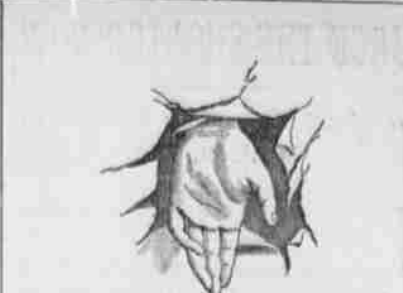
